### **Reports on Enrollment**

Central State had one of the largest enrollment increases in the State College system for the term beginning in September, 1960. Total enrollment reached 1802 compared to 1609. A record number of 788 freshmen were enrolled. The remaining enrollment was distributed as follows: sophomores 423; juniors 327; seniors 244; and specials 20. There has been some increase in the enrollment of women which is 629 this year. The enrollment of men is 1173.

Eighteen students enrolled from foreign countries including some new students from Hong Kong, Formosa, Kenya, Iran, and India. There are two new students from Hawaii making a total of four from that state.

Stevens Point is now about third among the State Colleges in total enrollment. It is anticipated that the fall of 1961 will see a total enrollment of 2010 and enrollment is expected to cross the 3000 mark in 1967. We are particularly pleased to see an upturn in the enrollment in the teaching divisions and in home economics.

# **Academic Departments**

The growth of the college has resulted in the offering of many new majors in recent years. In the spring of 1960 the Regents approved a new major in sociology. The college administration has recently divided the former social science department into separate departments of history, economics, political science, and sociology. Dr. George Dixon has been named chairman of sociology, Professor Garland Fothergill of political science, and Dr. James Jensen of economics.

It is expected that within another year or two at the most a major in political science will be available. Other new majors added within the past few years include speech, economics, and German. The college also revised the music program within the last year to provide for a new Bachelor of Music Degree which will give a stronger preparation in music for those going into that field. We believe that we now have the largest number of students enrolled in the music major of any of the State Colleges.

## **Extension and Saturday Class Enrollment**

Extension and Saturday class enrollment reached a new high in Stevens Point in September, 1960. A total of 457 students are enrolled in 17 extension classes which are offered at 13 extension centers in Central Wisconsin. A total of 337 students are enrolled in 14 Saturday classes which are being offered on the campus. A list of Saturday and extension course offerings for the second semester of 1960 – 61 can be secured by writing to the Extension Director after October 15.

It is here that they learn to make good use of their leisure time and can get help in planning their activities. Through the various committees of the Union Board, it provides a cultural, social and recreational program aiming to make free time a cooperative factor with study in education. In all its processes,

it strives to develop the person as well as the intellect. The building, together with the program of the Union tries to represent a well-considered plan for the community life of the College.

The Union Board, as well as the entire Union staff hopes to see many of you during this coming Homecoming Season. A full schedule of events is planned and the Union will be the center for most week-end activities. # HOME ECONOMICS ALUM NEWS 1960

The Home Economics Department welcomes you to a coffee hour at the home management house on Saturday morning, October 22, from 9: 30 – 11: 30. It is a good place to watch the parade and meet your friends. The housing class is in charge of arrangements with Helen Topping, Westfield, and Mrs. Carmen Briscoe, Stevens Point, serving as cochairmen. Bring your family and friends.

A graduate program in home economics is now being considered. We are making tentative plans to begin the program in the 1961 summer session with a course in clothing and textiles. The specific requirements of the program have not been completed, but will most likely follow the general plan of 3 - 6 credits in liberal arts; 3 - 6 credits in pedogogical foundations including three semester credits in a seminar in home economics education; 12 - 15 credits in home economics with two summers being offered at Stevens Point and two at the University of Wisconsin or Stout State College. Eventually, we expect the total program to be held at CSC.

Those interested in graduate work should write to Dr. Burdette Eaton or Dr. Agnes Jones.

During the summer Miss Ethel Hill taught clothing and textiles at the University of Saskatchewan for six weeks.

Miss Doris Davis attended the Foods and Nutrition Institute at Iowa State University for two weeks in June.

Miss Elvire Thomson attended the "Institute on Counseling Consumers on the Use of Credit" at the University of Wisconsin, July 28 and 29.

Mrs. Agnes Jones served as publicity chairman for the Wisconsin School Food Service Association Convention in Stevens Point, August 17 – 19. She was elected secretary of the association for 1960 – 61. She also taught summer school at CSC.

Mrs. Fay Clifford has been added to the staff to teach clothing on a part time basis this semester.

The kitchen at the Home Management House and Miss Thomson's bedroom were redecorated this summer and presently the dining room and living room at the college are having a face lifting.

A workshop for clothing instructors in the Wisconsin Valley Vocational Schools was conducted on Saturday, September 24th. Miss Ethel Hill of the college Home Economics Department presented information on pattern selection, alteration of patterns and construction of a basic garment for fitting. Minerva Jipson of the Stevens Point Vocational School was in charge of arrangements. Twenty-five instructors representing seven cities attended the meeting.

We wish to thank our loyal alums for their support and encouraging home economics students to attend CSC. Our enrollment went up 20% this fall. We now have 133 majors.

Degree in Educational Administration from Northwestern University, and additional graduate work at the University of Minnesota, Stanford University, and Northwestern University, where he has specialized in the fields of guidance, curriculum, and administration.

He has taught at the Public Schools of Whitewater, Janesville, and Racine. His administrative experience includes positions of Vice-Principal and Principal at Racine and West Allis. Mr. Gach has been very active in a number of educational organizations within the state and contributed much to the disseminating of professional information through various professional publications.

In addition to his position as Director of the Secondary Division, he will serve as Assistant Director of Teacher Education and Placement and charged with the responsibilities of the off-campus student teaching program at the secondary level. We are sure that alumni will be interested in becoming acquainted with Mr. Gach as they have an opportunity to visit the campus.
