The frosh scored 42 points to lead in the scoring, followed by the sophomores, winners last year, with 35 points. 'The seniors scored 26 points to take third place, and the juniors trailed with 22.

Leaders in the individual scoring were Harold Reichert and Art Thomp-son, each of whom collected 15 points. Reichert made an impressive record, scoring firsts in the broad jump and the 100 yard dash, second in the 220, and hor yard dash, second in the 220, and third in the high jump and 120 yard high hurdles. Thompson romped off with firsts in the pole vault and high jump, second in the 120 yard high hurdles, and third in the low hurdles and the discus.

Berard led the frosh point makers, taking a first in the 220 an 440 dashes and a second in the low hurdles to score 13 points. Although the freshmen scored only one other first, that in the two mile, won by Carl Blom, they had sufficient team strength to amass the greatest number of points.


