Mr. Cadman Is Versatile

Among the many songs' composed by Mr. Cadman are: "From the Land of the Sky-blue Water", "At Dawning", and "I Hear a Thrush at Eve".

Cadman's work along more serious lines "has been received by the music loving public with the same enthusiasm that marked the reception of his lighter productions. Of his four grand operas, three have been produced. He has composed cycles, cantatas, piano suites and school operettas'

This dictionary is, without a doubt, the great dictionary of the language. It is compiled on a different plan from any of the other Standard Dictionaries and serves a different purpose.

Word History Shown It is based upon the application of the historical method of the life and use of words. Its purpose is to show the history of every word included from the date of its in-troduction into the language, showing the differences in mean-ing, spelling, pronunciation, usage, etc. throughout the differ-ent periods of the last eight hundred years. The authentic hundred years. The authentic source of this material traces back to the writers of the six-teenth century and as many as possible of the important writers since then.

Valuable Books /

Mr. Allez has been attempting to locate a set of this dictionary, that the library could afford to buy, for some years. A recent re-print at a much reduced price has made possible the purchase and made this set available for our students and faculty.
