After Platteville scored first on a field goal by Goff, the Pointers grabbed the lead and easily piled up a 14 to 6 margin. However, the Southern five refused to be counted out and when the first half ended the Central Staters held only a margin by virtue of the 16 to 14 score.

At the start of the second period, the Kotalmen rang up thirteen points before their opponents scored. With the large lead of 29 to 14 the Pointers matched points for the remainder of the game and finished the contest with the score at 47 to 29.
