ALL DEPARTMENTS SHOW INCREASE IN ENROLLMENT

To date there are 830 students enrolled in Central State Teachers' College. Night class enrollment has not yet been completed, so this figure only includes day students.

Every department has reported an increase over last year. In the High School Department, headed by Mr. Raymond R. Rightsell, there are now about 480 students. This is the largest enrollment in any one department of the college. The Home Economics Department, now being discontinued, is included in the High School Department.

Rurals Increase

Next in the number of enrollment is the Rural Department. There are 212 as compared to last year's 162. Mr. Oscar W. Neale, the head of the department, said, "After the night school enrollment is completed, we ought to have reached the 250 mark." This number includes 187 rural students and 25 state-graded students (principals and supervisors, also.)

Primary Larger

In the Primary Department, Miss Susan E. Colman announced that there are thirty new girls, making the total about eighty over last year's total of seventy girls.

An increase of about fifteen students was observed in Mr. Charles F. Watson's Intermediate Department. There were 45 students last year and 60 this year.

A. J. Herrick Is At Madison For Important Meeting

Mr. A. J. Herrick, Principal of the Training School, was called to Madison on Tuesday, September 26, to attend a meeting of the training school directors of the State Teachers Colleges and Stout Institute with the Assistant State Superintendent, J. F. Waddell, to draw up a new course of study for Wisconsin elementary schools. These directors were appointed last May to aid the State Department at the Wisconsin Training School Conference, which was held here at Stevens Point.

The last course of study was written in 1929 and is considered to be somewhat out-of-date. This is the first time that the Teachers Colleges of Wisconsin have had any part in the construction of such a course of study and much credit is due to the local training school

because of the successful conference held last year.

Mr. Doudna, President of the Board of Regents of Teachers Colleges, and J. F. Waddell will speak to the group on Wednesday at the Lorraine Hotel where formal and informal organization will take place.

Mr. Herrick will also attend a City Superintendents' Conference under the direction of State Superintendent, J. Callahan, on Thursday and Friday of this week.

Rogers Puts Chemistry To Practical Use In The Pea Canning Industry

Mr. T. A. Rogers, head of the C.S.T.C. chemistry department, has proven his ability as a chemist by his successful experiments in commercial canning.

Three years ago the Fox River Canning Company, at Hortonville, Wisconsin, was having difficulty in preserving the original taste and color of their peas. Mr. Rogers was called upon to assist and solved the problem. After experimenting for two years Mr. Rogers accomplished his goal and the company's peas were acclaimed excellent.

After completing his work, Mr. Schroeder, the president of the canning company, interested Mr. Rogers in developing the soy bean as a practical vegetable. The United States Department of Agriculture provided the plants for the experiments. By removing the fat content of the bean, Mr. Rogers has made it a popular vegetable.

Other researches have developed this plant beyond the vegetative stage and it has been processed into

the following products: celluloid substitute, glue, plastics, candles, enamels, oil, chocolate, dyes, ink, and cement.
