The purpose of the research, according to Dr. Weaver, is to study the properties of nucleoside diphosphokinase, a brain enzyme...

Dr. Weaver's desire to study this enzyme in brain cells stemmed mainly, he said, from recent studies involving the memory process...

Knowledge Of Brain Needed

The great need for additional knowledge of all aspects of brain chemistry is another reason for the study, Dr. Weaver explained...

Another important aspect of the project will be the opportunity for students at the university to take part in the research...

83 Percent Of WSU Grads Teach In Wisconsin

Reports from graduates who received bachelor degrees last year from the nine Wisconsin State Universities show that 2,375 are working as teachers, the heading of regents office in Madison reports.

Of those teaching, 1,970 or 83 per cent are teaching in Wisconsin schools, said Eugene R. McFlee, Director of State Universities. They include 190 men and 888 women teaching in elementary schools and 536 men and 346 women teaching in high schools and other schools.

A total of 4,117 students received bachelor degrees in Jan., June and Aug. of 1962 at the nine universities. In addition to those reported in teaching jobs last Nov., 658 reported that they were working in other jobs, 369 were continuing their education and 415 were in military service. The peace corps, homemaking or do not report.

Average salaries reported by the universities ranged from \$507 to \$599 a month for elementary teachers in their first year of teaching. Among the highest monthly starting salaries reported by other teachers were \$672 for a teacher of German from Whitewater, \$580 for a vocational education teacher from Stout, \$641 and \$644 for music teachers from River Falls and Eau Claire and an average of \$637 for 15 agriculture teachers from River Falls.

Reports from placement directors asked for their opinions on kinds of teaching teachers most in demand during the next five years indicated that the greatest shortages will be in elementary teachers, vocational education teachers, junior high teachers, industrial arts teachers, and teachers in library science. Surpluses are expected in the fields of drama, history, men's physical education, biology, social science and speech.

Recently, the Wisconsin State Board of Regents ruled that an undergraduate student, for social security purposes, is considered in full-time attendance, if he is carrying at least 12 semester hours during the regular session. Exceptions to this are teacher intern students carrying at least 8 semester hours and summer session students carrying at least 6 credit hours.

Benefits for the summer vacation months continue if the student was in full-time attendance in the spring and plans to return to school in the fall. Any student receiving social security benefits because of school attendance should contact his nearest social security office if he ceases to be a "full-time student" as stated in the criteria of the Board of Regents.

Newspaper Woman Advises Coeds On Career Preparation

"Prepare yourself for a dual role... in the family, in the world of work, and in the community," Mrs. Dorothy Witte Austin, women's writer on the Milwaukee Journal, urged WSU-Stevens Point co-eds Wednesday evening.

Speaking to the WSU Associated Women Students at the University Center, Mrs. Austin emphasized the importance of women's education and full development of individual talent potential.

"Women today have more choices than ever before and very few doors are closed to them unless they are doors closed by women themselves," Mrs. Austin commented.

Fulfillment of the dual role is strenuous, the speaker admitted but stated that women are ideally suited, physically and psychologically, for such challenge. "This is because our attention is personal, and the ability we have to carry on three conversations at once is the same talent that allows us to juggle three lives at once."

Home, she said, has departed from the traditional concept. If our place is home, then where is today's home but in the community and its many facets of education, recreation, and all services.

"Our country today needs the skills, leadership and the strengths of women as never before," she stated. Women have the opportunity to aim at top jobs, and the backing of a government which does not discriminate in sex, only abilities. And yet, because women have limited their own leadership development, the government has difficulty in obtaining well qualified women for top-level administrative positions, she observed.

"Now is the time to put up or shut up and women must find and do their best work or stop complaining," she concluded.

A graduate of Marquette University, Mrs. Austin has taught at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, and continues to work toward a master's degree. In her reporting assignments, she has interviewed many of the state's outstanding women, and has reported on the Governor's Commission on the Status of Women; her most recent series concerning the WSU-Stevens Point conference held last Saturday at the university.

These sentences are part of the statement of purpose of the Students and Poverty Workshop convened by Lawrence University and the Johnson Foundation. The workshop was held Apr. 22-24 at Lawrence University. Attending the conference from WSU-Stevens Point were Mr. Alvin Johnson, teacher in the geography department, and student William Sprague and Michael Anderson.

The conference examined all aspects of poverty and new methods to ameliorate, and possibly eliminate, the causes of poverty. Volunteer workers from East Harlem, Appalachia, South Chicago, and Washington, D.C. served as resource persons.

WASHINGTON, D.C. - College seniors or graduates can fulfill their military obligation as officers in the U.S. Coast Guard. Qualified applicants are notified of selection for Officer Candidate School before they enlist.

OCs classes convene in September and February at the Coast Guard Reserve Training Center in historic Yorktown, Virginia. There the carefully selected college graduates receive 17 weeks of intensive highly specialized training. Upon graduation they are commissioned as ensigns in the Coast Guard Reserve and serve on active duty for three years. Those qualified may be offered flight training.

Coast Guard officers receive the same pay and benefits as officers of other Armed Forces. Included are 30 days of annual leave and free medical and dental care.

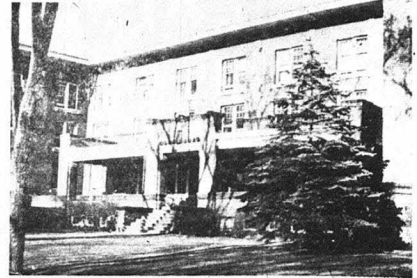
The Ten Commandments Of Nelson Hall

- X. Thou shalt not use an electric grill or an electric curling iron in thy room.

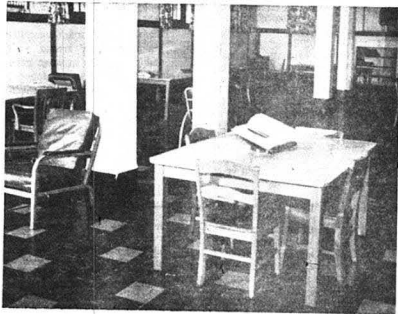

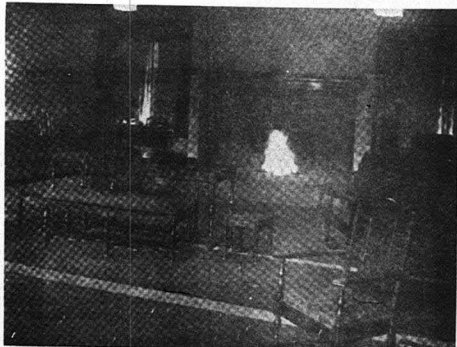

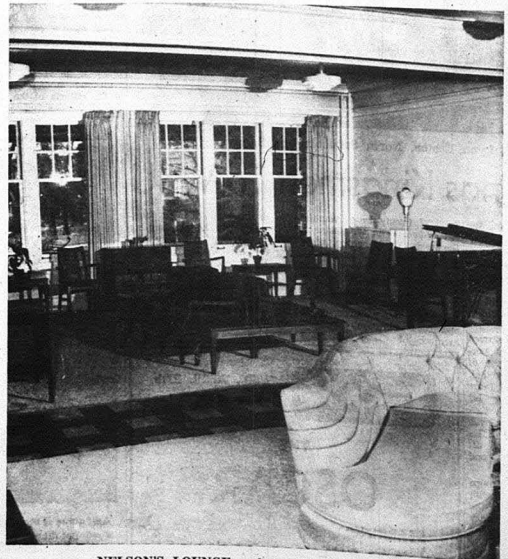

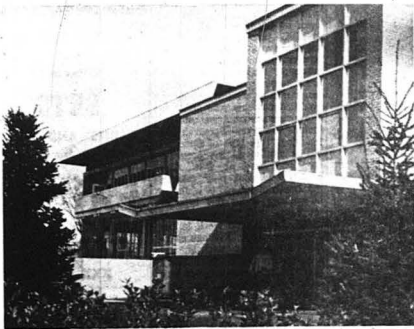
