

Delegates Attend Winter United Council Meeting

The United Council of Wisconsin State University student governments held its annual winter meeting in Eau Claire on Feb. 11 and 12. Approximately 150 representatives from the 9 state universities were in attendance for the session, which included 2 voting delegates from each school. The United Council, which represents nearly 40,000 students across the state of Wisconsin, held three such meetings each year.

The major place of legislation passed by the Council concerned the local option law for the serving of fermented malt beverages. The resolution states "The local option has contributed to needless accidents and deaths because of young people under 21 having to travel outside the local area of residence to obtain fermented malt beverages."

The United Council of the Wisconsin state university governments urges the repeal of the local option of raising the drinking age to consume fermented malt beverages."

Wisconsin assemblyman Tom Basland of Eau Claire was the guest speaker at the main banquet. He gave information on bills now pending in the state legislature pertaining to university students, and suggested that the United Council should have an officer whose sole purpose it is to keep in

Ph.D.'s On The Rise

The nine Wisconsin state universities have 430 more professors with Doctor of Philosophy degrees than they had five years ago, the Board of Regents Office in Madison reports.

"We are pleased that the quality of the facilities, as measured by the preparation of our teachers, continues to improve," said Eugene R. McPherson, director of state universities, in a report to regents and presidents.

The number of professors with Ph.D. degrees has increased 150 percent in the last five years, from 286 to 716. Meanwhile, the total number of faculty members has increased 19 percent from 974 to 2,133. Total enrollment the first semester was 38,592.

For the system, professors with Ph.D. degrees now make up 24 percent of the total faculties, compared with 29 percent five years ago.

To earn a doctor's degree, teachers must continue their studies the equivalent of four years after earning a bachelor's degree.

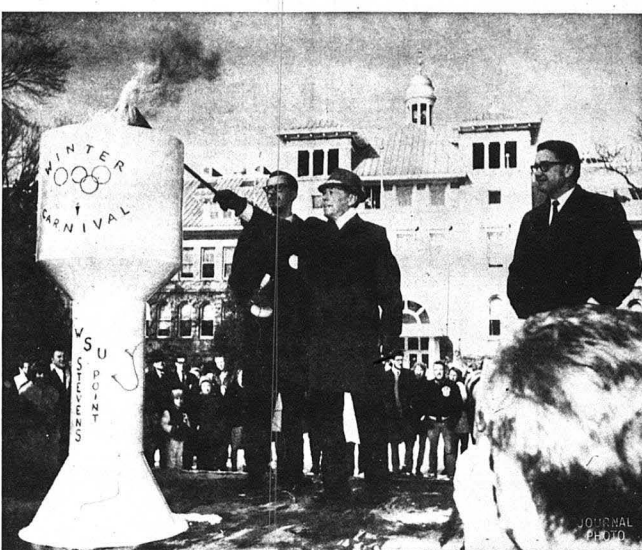
Second and third place winners of the Miss Stevens Point pageant will receive a trophy and a \$100 scholarship.

Chapman, Sandmann, Soroka Receive Grants

Research grants for three WSU-Stevens Point faculty projects in Negro literature, sculpture and printmaking, and Eastern and Central European history have been approved, announces Dr. James Albertson, WSU president.

By action of the Wisconsin State University Board of Regents Research Committee, a total of \$738 has been funded for studies by Abraham Chapman, Herbert Sandmann and Dr. Wacław Soroka.

Mr. Chapman, Associate Professor of English, was awarded \$200 to compile a comprehensive bibliography of American Negro literature. His research last year culminated in a summer session course, "The Negro in American Literature," and the interest of numerous educators and professional journals. Mr. Chapman, who joined the faculty in 1961 after teaching at the University of Chicago and the Institute of Modern Philology at Prague, will use the bibliographical data to study the present use of American Negro literature in the college English curriculum.

The parallel aspects of sculpture and relief effects will be studied by Herbert H. Sandmann, Assistant Professor of Art, who will receive \$239.58

for his proposal, "The Implications and use of Sculpture Surfaces for Relief and Intaglio Printing."

Mr. Soroka was granted \$298.16 for research titled "Basic Sources Related to the History of Eastern and Central Europe" (A selection).

Arriving in the United States from Poland in 1954, he holds a M.A. degree from Indiana University and both Master and Doctor of Laws degrees from Louvain University, Belgium.

In submitting the request for approval of his research, Dr. Soroka indicated his intent to collect documents relating to the history of Eastern and Central Europe. Many of these, which must be translated to English are located in Midwestern Universities. Eventually the documents will be reproduced for use by students of European History.

A meeting was held Thursday, February 11 for the off-campus students so that they might organize their group and participate in activities sponsored by the school. The meeting was called to order by Bruce Parker. Sixty students were present and 29 more sought membership. It was decided to begin the organization with temporary officers and elect permanent ones later. The present officers are Bruce Parker - president, John Weirle - vice-president, Debbie Walker - secretary, and Joyce Edwards - treasurer. It was also decided to charge a temporary dues of \$50 to cover expenses. A five man committee including Dan Holloway, Dave Jurgeles, George Klingbeil, Terry Louis, and Art Sommers are in the process of drawing up a constitution.

All off-campus students are welcomed to join. An announcement for the next meeting will be posted for those interested. The requirements for eligibility are that the person must be a student at WSU and not live in a dorm.

Higher Education Gets Financial Boost

A new scholarship program for worthy and needy students at vocational and technical schools, which improves the leadership and need scholarships for students as the University of Wisconsin and state universities, was signed into law last week by Governor Warren P. Knowles.

The bill expands the state honor scholarship program for academically talented graduates of Wisconsin nonprofit public and private high schools who are enrolled in approved institutions of higher education in their first year, including students in degree programs approved by the State Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education and approved nursing schools throughout the state. Scholarships are based on the financial needs of the student and are in the amount of \$100 to \$800, but may not exceed 67 percent of the institution's financial needs at the student's home.

Requirements for eligibility include: (1) only Wisconsin residents are eligible; (2) all scholarship recipients must be graduates in the upper 10 percent of their graduating class; (3) the student must plan to attend an accredited university, college or nursing school in Wisconsin, or attend to enroll in an associate degree program at an accredited institution; (4) one scholarship recipient must be a first-time student planning to enroll in a full-time program at an accredited institution; (5) an honor scholarship recipient may not intend to enroll in a course leading to a degree in theology, divinity, religious education or be a religious aspirant.

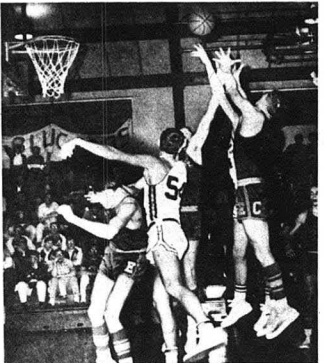
Burns Replaces Counsell as Football Coach

Pointers Take Revenge On Eau Claire 106-78

Jerry Lawetzk's scoring spray and Chuck Ritzenhaller's defensive play sparked the WSU Stevens Point basketball team to a victory over Eau Claire in a Conference game Saturday night at the Stevens Point Fieldhouse, 106-78. The victory was one of revenge for the Pointers, after suffering a 102-84 humiliation at Eau Claire on Dec. 16.

Ritzenhaller, a 6' Junior guard, stole a pass intended for high-scoring Stan Johnson and took it in for a quick score and then there was never a let-up. Lawetzk's jump shot made it 4-0 with 28 seconds gone. The Pointers then moved the score to 12-5 before the Blugolds rallied on baskets by Jim Severson, Roy Campbell, Larry and Stan Johnson and Pete Holden. The score showed 16-15 for Stevens Point and Holden's jumper gave Eau Claire its only lead of the game at 17-16. Ritzenhaller's shot from the corner tied it at 18-16 with 12:37 to go and forward Mike Fortuna's bucket 41 seconds later put the local cagers ahead for good, 20-18. Coach Krueger's charges then moved to a 38-30 lead as Lawetzk got hot and scored 11 straight points in four minutes and 17 seconds. In the remaining 4:23, the Blugolds rallied to cut the Pointer lead to 49-45 at intermission. During the last 2 and 1/2 minutes of the first half, the Pointers could muster only two points, that on a basket by Wes Zeuge with 3:30 remaining in the half.

First half statistics showed the Pointers shooting 39 per cent and hitting 23 per cent of their 53 attempts. The Blugolds also found the range, hitting on 16 of 30 shots for 53 per cent. Both teams halted down 12 rebounds, but Eau Claire hit on 7 of 11 free throws to give it a 16-12 lead. In the second half, the Blugolds stayed with the Pointers while the score read 55-51 with 16:51 remaining. Then, however, the visitors could not find the basket. Point by virtue of Jerry Lawetzk and Wes Zeuge, upped the score to 65-51 and the game was out of reach for the faltering guests. Featuring a strong defense and balanced scoring attack, the freshmen moved the score to 57-32 at halftime. All but one Pointer scored in the half with Terry Dieck's 9 and Dave Flaehke's 8 points leading the pack.

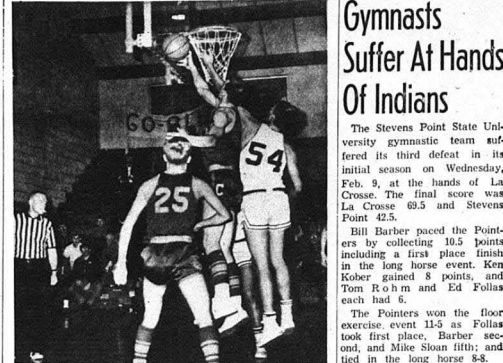
