

Last Monday Dr. William Dawson gave his "last lecture." Those of us who heard him speak will long remember his words. Those of you who did not hear him will probably ask: "why?"

Well, I'll answer you. Dr. Dawson's words will be remembered because he spoke as a man should speak no hanky-panky, but to the point. It is true he spoke as a rebel. (he even termed himself such) but I can assert that this rebel is one with a cause. His cause is concern, concern for his fellow man and the world around him. He looks for the good man, the honest man, the man who will put forth effort in the face of obstacles and hostility, hostility that sometimes inspires a human being to blow his brains out.

Don't fool yourselves, there is hostility. For instance, how do we, as a majority, view the thinking man? Even at this "university" we just tolerate him. Winter Carnival is more important.
