## The New

### Student Senate Urges Adoption Of New Drinking Policy

On Mar. 24th, 1966, the Student Senate held open hearing to discuss the recent operational policy of the Student Senate in regard to the consumption of alcoholic beverages. Mr. William Stelstra, Vice-President for student groups, presented the present drinking policy, and the grounds upon which it had been established. After a period of questioning and free discussion the Student Senate adopted the following drinking proposals which they believe should replace our present policy.

"The responsibility for the behavior of the student rests with that student and is based upon his relationship with his social institutions. The University expects all students to conduct themselves with poise and dignity and with due consideration for the inherent rights of others.

"The student is responsible for compliance with the following University regulation concerning the use of alcoholic beverages:

- The possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages on the campus or in approved off-campus housing by any student or student organization is prohibited.
  - Consumption of alcoholic beverages by recognized student groups may be approved only at closed events held within the confines of a licensed establishment.
  - A closed event is one sponsored by an organization and is limited to its own members. If guests are to be present approval is needed from the Student Activities Office.
  - Off-Campus, the student is responsible to state authorities for compliance with the state law regarding the use and possession of alcoholic beverages. This includes those students participating in University approved social events or recognized student organizations.
- The suggested policy written above will now go through various legislative committees before adoption or rejection.

### 'Adventures In Photography' Series To End

The last in a series of photography tips produced by the Kodak Film Company will be presented Thursday, March 31 at 7 p.m. in the Wisconsin Room, University Center. Sponsored by the University Center Board Cultural Committee and John Schellkopf, WSU senior from Oshkosh, Wis., the series provides hints to improve the ability of the amateur photographer.

"Four Keys To Color" is a pictorial slide show including spectacular American scenery. Subjects include national parks and monuments in the South-

west, Caribbean tours, and night-time entertainment in Las Vegas.

Research and production problems are the subjects of "Photography at Work." Uses of photographic precision in industry and quality control are shown.

The use of creative color combinations in advertising is presented in "Color Collage." Photography's contribution to changing ideas, motivated sales and new approaches to advertising are studied in the third film.

### Re-dedication Set For May 1

Facilities in the new University Center addition, completed last fall, will be rededicated to special ceremonies Sunday afternoon, May 1.

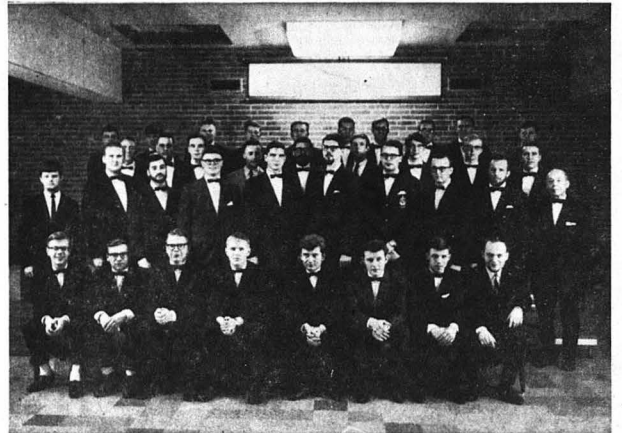
Sponsored by the University Center Board, the open house from 1 to 5 p.m. will include special entertainment, a variety of exhibits, and displays in the Center as well as arts and history displays. Tom Goltz, UCB House chairman, is in charge of arrangements.

The \$725,000 facility, comprising 18 rooms and 25,000 square feet of floor space is now in full operation. Each of the rooms will be open, and will include some display or activity planned by various committees of the UCB. A jazz band, a popular band, and an art exhibit directed by Dr. Robert Cantrick, Dean of the WSU school of Fine Arts, are among the attractions planned for the afternoon program.

In the Wisconsin Room, a multi-purpose room located in the Center, a display will be a display illustrating the history of WSU's past development and plans for the future. The exhibit is being arranged by Ray Specht, Geography Department.

The public will also be invited to tour the "Gridiron" snack bar area, the "Pinery" is a card dining room, the "Paul Bunyan Dining Room," and the meeting rooms named for Wisconsin's prominent educators and citizens including John Muir, Carl Schurz, Governor Dodge, Jean Nicolet, Marie Marquette, Frederick Jackson Turner, Hamlin Garland, General Billy Mitchell, and Charles Van Hise and the lounges named in honor of Governor Robert M. La Follette, Frank Lloyd Wright and Zora Gale-Edna Ferber.

Also open for public inspection will be the offices of the State and local dignitaries who have been invited to participate in the rededication ceremonies, and a dinner in their honor scheduled 5 p.m. in the Frank Lloyd Wright Lounge.

Under the direction of Norman Knutzen, the Glee Club will sing on the House Steps of the Capitol at 11:20 a.m. Thursday, April 7. The invitation was extended by Congressman Melvin R. Laird, and permission granted by Speaker McCormack.

The Glee Club will also sing in the current tour is the second Washington visit for the Glee Club. In 1963 the Glee Club toured the Capitol

### Paper Prompts Discussion On U.S. Policy

Last Wednesday night several members of Baldwin Hall participated in a discussion on U.S. policy in Vietnam. Jim Larson, director of Smith Hall, was the moderator in the absence of Dr. Kurt Schmeller, assistant to President Albertson, who was unfortunately ill.

Main discussion centered around the legality of United States' interference in Vietnam and the moral aspects of "Mamam's War." The "son" team used the Geneva Accords of 1954 to show that Vietnam was only one country and that

therefore the United States could not base its policy on the aggression of the North. The "pro" side of Wallenfang and a Duette claimed that a South Vietnam was a legal country, by the Manila Pact. Such interest was stirred that questions brought the discussion to a reluctant end after two and a half hours.

The panel discussion was just one of many events that the Baldwin men are participating in at a hall level. 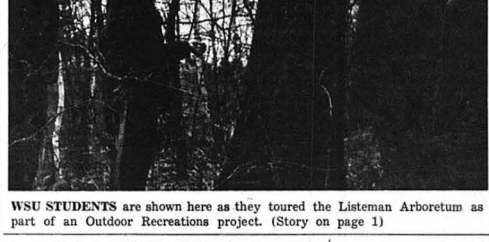

## Pointers Sweep 8 Of 12 In First Track Meet

Stevens Point track hopes were bolstered Saturday as Coach Don Hoff's charges rolled over Stout and River Falls at Stout State Universities in an indoor triangular meet at the Stout Fieldhouse. The Pointers swept eight of twelve heats to outscore the foes, 68-43.5, in their initial track meet.

Dale Roe, a freshman miler from Antigo, was the meet's only double winner, breaking fieldhouse records in the Mile and Two Mile runs. Roe was timed at 4:37.4 in the Mile and 10:20 in the Two Mile event. The other winners were Pat Mason, Wisconsin Rapids, led the Pointer domination in the Shot Put, Mason's winning toss of 45-1 1/4" was followed by junior Dave Dehlinger and sophomore Larry Whiffen who placed second and third respectively with throws of 44 5/8" and 43 11 1/2".

Stevens Point swept all four places in the 880 Yard Run with a margin of 10 seconds. The four Pointers moved out in front and paced themselves apart to keep anyone from cutting in, and ended up all alone. Dick Leslie, a freshman from Sheboygan led the crushing quartet across the finish line with a time of 2:04.3, a new fieldhouse record. Another freshman, Mike Richmond of Wauwatosa, was three tenths of a second behind Leslie. Two sophomores, Jim Cattenough and Larry Greenwood, placed third and fourth coming in two seconds behind the runner-up. The other four were under the record.

Jim Kuetella, a Stevens Point sophomore, who returned to the team after a year in the Peace Corps, placed first in the 220 with a time of 21.5 seconds and second in the 50 Yard Dash covering the distance in a mere 5.7 seconds. Perhaps the most disappointing appearance for the Pointers came in the hurdles. Senior Mike Cattenough and junior Dick McGinley finished thirteenth and fifteenth respectively in the 100 yard freestyle fishing in times of 51.9 and 52.0.

Dave Steinitz, Delevan, placed eleventh in the 200 yard breaststroke with a 2:28.8 timing in the finals after he had placed thirteenth in the 100 yard breaststroke earlier in the meet. His 1:11.6 in the 100 yard event was registered as 1:07.5.

The relay teams also made their presence known. Simkins, Steinitz, Gelwicks and Conachen covered a seventh place in the 400 yard medley relay as they knocked three seconds off the old variety record with a 2:55.1 timing. In the 400 yard freestyle relay, Dan Netzer, Rhineland, Gene Bishop, Wauwatosa, Conachen and Gelwicks led the Pointers to a ninth place finish and set a new variety record at 3:20.4.

Bill Gelwicks, Freeport, Ill., and Joe Conachen, Pickerington, placed thirteenth place in the 100 yard freestyle with times of 52.2, a new variety record. The pair later finished thirteenth and fifteenth respectively in the 100 yard freestyle fishing in times of 51.9 and 52.0.

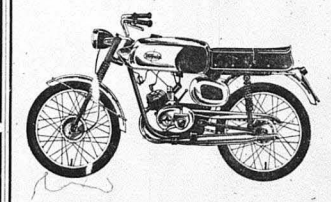
