'Child's-Eye View' To Be Telecast

How children "tune out" their parents, absorb science from the dishpan and set the table with modern math will be shown on a unique series of television programs being videotaped by the WSU Stevens Point Campus Laboratory School.

The series of four half-hour programs presenting a child's-eye view of his home environment and the learning processes taking place there will be telecast by WSAU-TV beginning Sunday afternoon, May 8, and continue each week at 3 p.m. through May 29.

Planned by the Campus School faculty, the series is designed to create a parent awareness between the home and school. New techniques in education will be emphasized, and parents will have the opportunity to use these ideas in continuing this learning process within the home.

Campus School students and WSU speech majors will take part in the program series to include "How to Listen to What," May 8; "Science in Your Dishpan," May 15; "The House That Math Built," May 22; and "People Places and Planets," May 29.

The program format has been directed by Miss Irene Gray and Mrs. Renee Langen, WSU faculty members serving in the Campus School classes. The series, however, evolved through the combined efforts of the Campus School faculty in discussion sessions utilizing the team teaching approach for the preparation of program materials.

"How to Listen to What," the first program, explores the fast moving world of modern noise. Bombarded by sound, today's child is seldom without the distraction of noise. The program, a practical application

of contemporary studies on listening, illustrates how a child "tunes out" or develops a functional deafness to concentrate on a given task. Parents will be shown ideas to help the child develop this skill which can and must be used for desired focus on a particular activity.

"Science in Your Dishpan" will point out the many science concepts which actually originate in the home. Before the child enters school, he has had countless experiences in science. The school provides the framework to organize these experiences into meaningful patterns. The program will illustrate how the child's interest about major topics, matter and energy, can expand and develop both at home and in the classroom.

"The House That Math Built" will illustrate practical applications of modern math and how the new math sets can be applied to such simple home tasks as setting the table. Shapes and dimensions of com-

Committee Discusses Women's Hours

The committee to discuss the proposal concerning women's hours met on Thursday, April 21. The committee at present consists of Helen Godfrey, Kay Thompson, Barbara Bosley, Karen Jensen, Fred Leafgren, and John Wehrle.

Miss Jensen presented copies of the survey form which has been sent out to 500 colleges and universities throughout the nation. The information gained from this survey will be tabulated and presented for use by this committee.

The committee feels it would like to reach definite decisions concerning the direction to be moved in prior to the close of the semester, so that the women may be informed prior to leaving the campus and that handbooks and other publications may have the most recent information available.

The committee agreed that we need to think in terms of long range objectives, and that we need to be concerned with on-going programs where by the incoming students are provided opportunities to understand and accept responsibilities for themselves and their associates which are commensurate with the demands of the community in which they are residing. It is necessary that they begin to achieve the responsibility — assuming process and the decision-making process appropriate for students enrolled at an institution of higher learning. Such programs will be provided for the incoming students and will be commensurate with the needs and in smaller groups for both men and women. They are presently being planned in the residence halls.

The committee is further discussing various plans for programs in the future that may exist. The committee will continue to meet weekly until a plan is approved, satisfactorily combining all of these factors.

Summer Study Scheduled For Pigeon Lake

The summer study program at the State University system's northwoods campus near Drummond will start June 6 and end Aug. 26, the board of regents office at Madison reports. About 150 students will attend.

National Science Foundation grants totaling \$60,751 will support two biology programs from June 26 to Aug. 6 at

Pigeon Lake Field Station in the Chequamegon National Forest, said Robert DeZonia, Assistant Director of State University. Also scheduled are three-week workshops for teachers in art education and outdoor education, Aug. 9-26, and a meeting for State University building planners June 6-10.

Directing the graduate level field biology program for 42 high school science teachers for the third summer will be Prof. Mark Fay of WSU-Eau Claire, assisted by Prof. Carl Schmitt of Eau Claire, David Conover of Oshkosh, Russell Wagner of Platteville and Hollie Collins of the University of Minnesota at Duluth. Students receive NSF grants of \$500 each.

The undergraduate field biology program for 40 state university students taking majors and minors in biology will be directed by Prof. Clyde Brascher of Superior, assisted by Prof. Richard Bernard of Superior. The students will receive \$300 each in NSF support.

The outdoor education workshop for school teachers will be taught by Prof. Paul Nagel of Eau Claire and E.M. Lory of Stout State University at Menomonie. Teaching the art education workshop will be Prof. Henry Runke of Eau Claire and Verna Thompson of Platteville. Inquiries about the programs should be sent to Prof. Nagel or Runke.

 The Pointers defeated the St. Norbert Green Knights 7-0, after six unsuccessful attempts dating back to 1962. The win on Thursday left Jim Clark's team with a 4-1 mark, while the loss for the Green Knights dropped them to 2-5.
 The teams were slated for a double-header, but due to weather conditions a single nine-inning game was decided upon. Seven Green Knight batters worked the middle three, allowing three hits, one free pass, and wiffing two. Ron Grunden, a freshman, finished up, giving two hits and a walk, but fanning six, five of them in a row.
 The scoring for the Pointers came in two-run patterns in the first, third and fifth innings, and a single tally in the eighth.
 In the first inning, after two outs, Jim Fitzgerald and Jim Hansen advanced to second and third on two infield errors. They scored on Tom Heimerl's double to left.
 Phil Berkel led off the third inning with a single and a 4-4 promptly stole second. Jerry DeBruin worked the inning with a fine-dribble double, and followed him in on a throwing error by the shortstop.
 In the fifth inning three throwing errors by the Knights and a fielder's choice on Jim Fitzgerald's opening single put two more runs on the board for the Pointers.
 Al Larsen, the first sacker, closed the scoring for the Pointers with a long home run in the eighth.
 Each team had six hits, with only two of the Pointers tallies coming as earned runs.

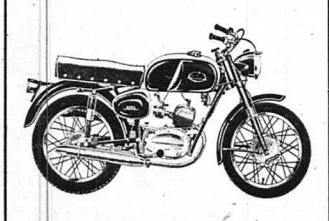
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BOB KENSSETL in the bottom position of the squat style snatch, one of the three Olympic lifts.

Weightlifter Kenseth Wins In Milwaukee Open Meet

The WSU Weightlifting has certainly been given considerable representation in its recent weightlifting by its Senior president, Bob Kenseth. Last fall Bob entered and won his weight division in the Wisconsin State weightlifting meet, and this month on April 15, he again won his weight division in the Milwaukee Open Weightlifting meet, held in Milwaukee.
 The Milwaukee Open, stiffer competition than the state meet, saw representatives from eight states compete for top honors. Wisconsin, Michigan, Illinois, Indiana, Minnesota, Nebraska, Ohio, and Pennsylvania were represented. Bob won over 150 other lifters in the 181 pound division, to take top honors with olympic lifts of press—240, snatch—220, and clean and jerk—305, for a very commendable total of 775.
 Bob's total increased by around 30 pounds between the two competitions, and is ample evidence that the WSU club's training facilities in Iyer Hall are well suited to serious weight lifting as well as all around conditioning. Bob as a Senior June Graduate plans to go into Y.M.C.A. work, and we wish his continued success. 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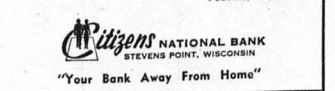
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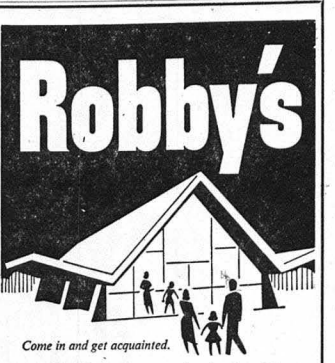
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
