R.A.s And S.A.s Trained Under New Program

The developing residence hall training program is now in effect at WSU-Stevens Point. Aspects of the program are educational, social and psychological.

Mr. Fred Laefgren, Director; Mr. Dennis Ellsworth, Asst. Director and Miss Helen Godey, Asst. Dean of Students are working together to prepare resident and student assistants to accept the responsibility of working with other students successfully.

The assistants were trained at a 3 day workshop Sept. 29 at Green Lake. Understanding the role as a member of the residence hall and university staff was the theme of the workshop.

Areas covered at the workshop were campus culture and student characteristics, counseling and interviewing, group dynamics and leadership, psycho-

logical development, mental health and stress on students, scholarship and study habits, student conduct and values.

The speeches and discussion groups were primarily geared to orient the students to university objectives and goals. Dr. William Stielstra, Vice Pres. of Student Affairs spoke on personal services. Dr. Kurt Schmeller, Asst. to the Pres. spoke on the university community and higher education.

The Dean of the School of Letters and Science, Dr. Warren Jenkins, spoke on the academic development of the student. Miss Godey talked on university regulations and policy changes. Student dilemmas were discussed by Dr. David Coler, Director of Counseling Center.

Mr. Marge Coker, Director of Student Activities talked on the social development of the student.

The workshop also allotted time for recreation. On this basis the students got to know each other.

Qualifications for all assistants include a 2.25 grade point, a good disciplinary record, and activity in social functions. Interviews, personality tests, and recommendations of the hall director are also requirements.

To become a resident assistant, one must have had previous experience as a student assistant. All the assistants, resident and student, are selected not elected.

The new student assistants are enrolled in a non credit course meeting 3 times a week during this semester. The course will further orient, and cover topics prevalent to the college community.

Mr. Ellsworth said a university experience should "produce a change in the individual." The assistants getting to know their groups and working closely with them can ease anxieties better and instill security. They can help the individuals in their group to understand themselves. Learning about yourself is important in an education.

He also noted the importance of getting "accurate information." The hall directors, resident and student assistants, have correct information. They also have a proper referral to the offices needing more information.

Mr. Ellsworth agreed that one of the objectives of the program is to "contribute to the total educational program at WSU."

Various Aid Goes Out To WSU Students

The Financial Aids Department headed by Mr. R.G. Ross-miller is in the process of sending out checks to students who are in the financial aid program. These checks go to students in the form of state and federal scholarships, grants and loans.

To be eligible, a student must first make application and supply all necessary data. The student's qualifications and needs are then matched with the several available aid programs.

Each student who does apply will receive a written response to his application. If aid is given the amounts and kinds will be outlined.

First semester aids are virtually all committed. But additional persons who apply will be considered in the 2nd semester, as the funds permit.

Last year the total enrollment at the nine state universities was 38,592. About 80% of every 10 students received some form of financial aid.

As of this date, on-our own Stevens Point campus, nearly 1600 student applications have been or are being processed. This is about 22 per cent of our enrollment.

The approximate total amount of funds available to our Stevens Point University is \$872,000. This is subdivided into the aid sources:

Federal Educational Opportunity Grant, \$69,000

Wisconsin Legislative Scholarship (IRS), \$178,000

Wisconsin Legislative Scholarship (Non-IRS), \$29,000

National Defense Loans, \$190,000

Federal Work Study, \$400,000

State Loans (available as need basis)

Local Scholarships (estimate) \$6,000

Maestro Stokowski has invited her to appear with him in his guest series with the Philadelphia Orchestra for five appearances during Nov. and he will present her with his own American Symphony Orchestra at Carnegie Hall.

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MARIA LUCIA GODOY, a soprano soloist from Brazil, will appear at the Auditorium, October 3, as part of this year's Arts and Lectures Series.

These applications will then be reviewed by the executive board of the Senate and ratified by the Senate.

Requirements for membership on a Student-Faculty Committee are a 2.25 G.P.A. and willingness to give up 5 to 6 hours a month of your time.

Mr. Thomas also passed out organ literature and pamphlets of interest, which can be found and read in the organ room on third floor in Old Main.

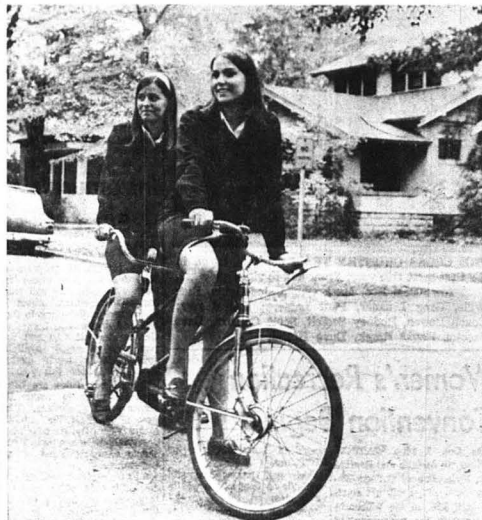
Lastly, it was decided to hold monthly studio classes on the third Tuesday of every month, at 6:30 p.m. in the organ room mentioned above.

Haferbecker Lectures In Oregon

Dr. Gordon Haferbecker, WSU-Stevens Point Vice-President for Academic Affairs, was guest lecturer at the Oregon Economic Education Foundation Workshop held Sept. 12 and 13 at the University of Oregon, Eugene, Oregon.

For the workshop program, similar to the Wisconsin CEEF program held annually in June at WSU, Dr. Haferbecker presented four lectures, "Labor Management Relations in the United States," "The Impact of Increased Productivity and Automation on the American Economy," "Labor Management Interest in the National Economy," and "The Distribution of Income."

Other workshop speakers were faculty members from the University of Oregon and Oregon

State University, Corvallis, Oregon, and representatives of the state commerce department banks.

The purpose of the CEEF Workshop programs, according to Dr. Haferbecker, is to "bring an honest, factual, and comprehensive analysis of the American-free enterprise system to members of the clergy." Working with academic economists, practicing economists, and other specialists, clergymen are able to explore ways of improving economic understanding.
