## Dr. Doolin Speaks On 'Red China Analysis'

He will conduct a seminar, open to anyone interested, at 3:30 p.m. in the University Center, Turner Room, and will present his lecture, "Red China Analysis," at 8:00 p.m. in the classroom center. Dr. Doolin is presently teaching government and political science at Stanford University, and is in charge of research on East Asian affairs at the Hoover Institution on War, Revolution, and Peace.

Well qualified in his field, Dr. Doolin has written three books: "Communist China" "The Politics of Student Opposition"

The formation of The Podium Society, a new campus honorary, in public address and debate is announced by Dr. Sheldon Flukner, Chairman, Dept. of Speech and Drama.

The Podium is an outgrowth of the University Debators and will function under the Department of Speech. Glenn H. Rogers, director of debate activities, will be advisor to the group.

The purpose of the group is to train students for participation in inter-collegiate debating activities. They will promote intra-campus speech activities and engage in community service activities, in which the National Debate Question will be given as a symposium to community service clubs. The group will also cooperate with high school teachers and speech activities in this area.

These members have been taking part in inter-collegiate debate and filling speaking engagements through out the area.

At present an inter-hall and fraternity speech competition is being planned as a campus activity during the month of April. New freshman and sophomore pledges will be taken in at this time.

## 'Dark Of The Moon' Opens Four-Day Run

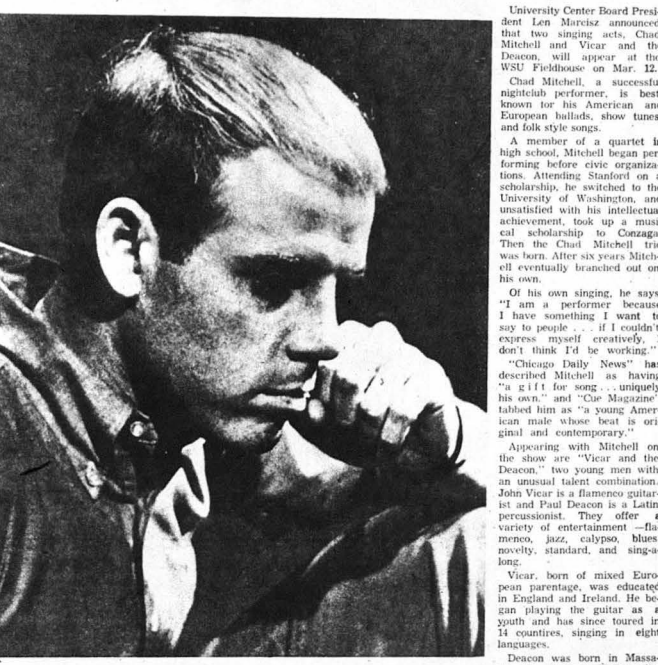

## Zawadsky Slated For UCB Lecture

Dr. John P. Zawadsky, chairman of the philosophy department, will speak for the Last Lecture series on Mon, Mar. 13 at 7 p.m. in the Nicolette-Marquette Room. His lecture, titled "Answering the Unanswerable" will consider the function of philosophy "in all worlds" not just today's world.

Dr. Zawadsky considers philosophy as the starting point of many disciplines such as psychology, sociology, and multi-cultural studies.

Dr. Zawadsky received his B.A. from Rutgers University and his M.A. and Ph.D. from Harvard. He has specialized in Russian philosophy and also done work at the Russian Research Center at Harvard. Dr. Zawadsky came to Stevens Point in 1966 and was previously at Rutgers.

Mr. Robert Seales of the Biology department showed a slide of a trip taken in the Wisconsin River in a canoe.

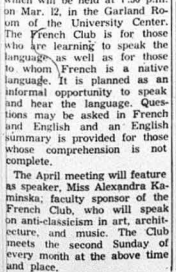
The slides were accompanied by a tape which told the story. The tape also included sound effects appropriate to the different slides.
