
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


We present to you this IRIS of 1939 with the hope that it is something you can enjoy and cherish as a souvenir of your happy days spent here at C. S. T. C.


Our theme is that of an airplane view, with the idea of giving to you a "flying sight" of a year in our school, its happiness, its work, its trials and disappointments and its personal success.




In Memoriam

VISUAL EDUCATION



The Training School is one of the outstanding units of our college. Children from this city come here and receive instruction in accordance with many of the newer trends in education and child development. The pupils on the playground and members of the Junior Safety Patrol on nearby road crossings serve to remind underclassmen that this is truly an institution for teacher training.

Seniors at C.S.T.C. receive their first teaching experience in typical classroom situations at the Training School under the guidance of critics. The prospective teacher spends a specified number of hours in "practice teaching" before he is qualified for graduation or a teaching position.

This year there are three new members on the faculty of nine: Miss Stull, social studies and geography critic; Miss Loomer, critic of seventh, eighth, and ninth grade English; and Miss Dearborn, second grade critic. The school is divided into the three regular units—primary, intermediate and junior high.


During the year each grade carries out several projects, has holiday parties, and stresses outside activities through various clubs and student publications under the direction of the critics and student teachers.





B.S. and B.E. degrees are offered in this department. Many of the outstanding students are enrolled here. A standard has been set by the director, which has not been surpassed by any other department in the college.

For many years, Mr. E. T. Smith has been the director of the department of secondary education. At the end of the first semester this year, Mr. Smith was appointed acting president of the college; however, he continued in his capacity as administrator of the department.

The high school department has come a long way since its founding in 1914. At that time two and three year courses were offered in the field. These courses were eliminated when the demand for more thoroughly trained teachers became apparent and in 1926, the four year degree curriculum was instituted. During 1938, the B.S. degree was first offered to students having taken the required number of hours in science. The standards are being raised to more nearly meet those of the university because so many of the students continue in graduate work.

Vast changes have been effected in the primary department within the past few years. Miss Susan E. Colman, the administrator of the department, is striving toward higher efficiency and more outstanding attainment from her primary teachers. Last year, the department became affiliated with the Association for Childhood Education, a national primary organization. Plans were made for the first time this year for a Primary Homecoming. Invitations were extended to all primary graduates since 1932, Miss Colman's first year here. The scheme was of special interest and value to the group.

LAVERNE VAN DYKE - HB



ART BANDOW - G




HANK NIMZ - F


