THE OUTLOCK

Some changes have been made in the objectives and purposes of Central State since some of you were students here. We have recently been authorized to offer four years of Letters and Science work leading toward a liberal arts degree of B.A. or B.S. It is too early to predict what this change will mean in the way of students and enrollment. It does enable Central State to serve this area as a general college where students may attend at a very reasonable cost and yet,we think,obtain a very good general education. We are near the completion of a new dormitory for men,Delzell Hall. It should be open by the beginning of the second semester. We are hopeful that it will attract some young men here who are looking for the advantages of dormitory life in connection with their college education. A faculty committee is now at work also on plans for a new college library,which we hope to have under construction sometime next summer or fall. This is a very brief picture of some of the new developments which we think makes the outlook better for the future for Central State.

Enrollment at the college this fall totals 707 in comparison with 808 a year ago. This drop is similar to that throughout the country, but nevertheless is of concern to your college.

Fortunately the drop has not occured among those planning to study elementary education, a field in which the shortage of teachers continues to be critical. On the contrary this college continues to increase the number of prospective elementary teachers being prepared. In 1952 Wisconsin State College at Stevens Point will graduate about 70 students from the four year courses in elementary education. As recently as four years ago the number was only 13. This expansion results largely from guidance of students into the elementary field who came to college undecided as to occupational preference.

Another encouraging note in enrollment figures is seen in the continuing high quality secondary school graduates being recommended as freshmen by principals in the area and by the alumni of the college. Nearly one-fifth of the freshmen in the fall of 1951 had scores above 90 on the entrance formula. Half of the students were in the upper 30 per cent and over four-fifths were in the upper half in terms of their entrance formula scores, The formula is computed on the basis of rank in high school class and rank on a college aptitude test.

The college will continue to serve well if friends of the school maintain an interest in recommending Wisconsin State College, Stevens Point to capable young people at a time when they are selecting a school.

- (1)Full placement services for all Central State graduates with two or more years of successful teaching experience. Credentials are kept up-to-date and candidates recommended for professional promotions to more challenging teaching, supervision and administrative assignments. Splendid opportunities are available for capable Central State graduates who are interested in these new positions.
 - (2)Placement services are available for graduates of the college of Letters and Science. Complete credentials are prepared and submitted to employment officials of industry, business and various professions. Similar placement services are available for candidates of this college as are extended to those of the teaching profession.

In the field of teacher education there are several useful and important organizations tending to bring greater unity of effort for institutional improvement among teachers colleges. The fourth annual workshop of the committee on Institutions For Teacher Education was one of them. The Center For Continuation Study of the University of Minnesota has been the workshop headquarters since its inception in 1948.

The staff representatives have concerned themselves with five areas of local study:

(1)The general education of teachers and others.

2) The provision of student and faculty personnel services.

(3) The professional education of teachers.

(4)College instruction and its improvement.

(5)Evaluation of the outcomes of college work.

We feel that the Alumni of Wisconsin State College will be interested in a brief history of our participation in these studies. On June 8,1950, President William C. Hansen appointed a special committee on general education consisting of Dr. Warren Jenkins, Chairman, Mr. Leland Burroughs, Dr. Roland Trytten, Mr. Erol Eppel, and Mr. Frederick Kremple. Mr. Nelis Kampenga worked with the committee in order to give bibliographical aid. This study group met each week during the summer term and early fall. The work of the committee was approved by the curriculum committee and then by the faculty.

Dr. Harold Tolo, our first workshop representative for North Central Studies, acted as local coordinator and organized the faculty into four sub-committees in general education. Under his leadership and the direction of Dr. Jenkins the faculty made an initial study of general educational program consisting of the following:

(1)Science

(2)Humanities

(3)Western Civilization (4)Social Science

(5) Written and spoken English.

At our regular faculty meeting,October 3,1951,President Hansen appointed a steering committee to suggest studies for this year. The members of this committee are Mr. Leland Burroughs,our workshop representative in the University of Minnesota for 1951, Dr. Warren Jenkins and Dr. Harold Tolo. A number of institutional studies, statistical and factual in nature, have been made; others are in progress. The committee is now organizing four sub-committees in the four areas of general education: Science, Humanities, Western Civilization and Social Science.

Dr. H.W.Reniger, chairman of the English Department, Iowa State Teachers College and Coordinator for North Central Studies, will visit the college some time in April.

The standards of the faculty of your college are high. W.S.C. is taking the lead, with the other colleges, in institutional studies.

Point's seven returning monogram winners are Anderson, Jones, Miller, Polka, Samelstad, Schadewald and Wagner. Probably the most valuable among this set are Polka and Wagner, who last season led the Pointers in scoring. Both are World War Two veterans and are the oldsters on the local squad. Wagner is 27 and Polka 24. Wagner scored 255 points in 21 games last season, 147 in the State College conference. Polka paced the team in all games last season with 273 points, in conference equalled Wagner's 147 markers.

The season's basketball race in the Wisconsin State College conference promises to be one of the most heated in several years. Point stacks up as one of the circuit's improved clubs.
