FROM THE DEAN OF INSTRUCTION

In September, 1959, the college opened with a new all-time high enrollment. There were 1610 students enrolled on September 24. These included 656 freshmen, 415 sophomores, 273 juniors, 243 seniors, and 23 special students. Enrollment was a little under earlier predictions but represented a substantial increase over the 1522 enrolled in September 1958.

Most of the freshmen had been in for one of several counseling days during the summer. They had planned their fall schedule of classes at that time.

This year twenty-one foreign students are enrolled including two from Kenya (Africa), five from Iran, two from Nationalist China, seven from Korea, and one each from British Guiana (South America), Germany, India, Malaya, and Norway. We also have two students enrolled from our newest state, Hawaii.

A new major, business education, was started this fall. In addition to providing for the training of teachers of shorthand and typing, this major will include advanced courses in accounting and business which will be useful to our economics majors. Academic majors which have been added within the last year include physics, German, and speech. The teaching major in music has been revised to expand the music content and a new Bachelor of Music degree has been authorized by the Regents.

We are pleased to report a substantial increase in freshman home economics enrollment. Our program in home economics is fully accredited by the federal education department, the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, and the Wisconsin Board of Vocational and Adult Education.

COLLEGE UNION OPEN HOUSE

To the Alumnus returning to the Campus for Homecoming this year, there will be a sight that many of you have looked forward to see. The College Union Building is open and in operation for the first time. An "Open House" is planned for all who are returning this weekend to acquaint you with its facilities.

The Homecoming weekend was selected as the formal opening date in order to make it convenient to the greatest number who are returning.

For many, this will be the first look at a project made possible by your support and money while you were students. As most of you know, the Union Building came into being through the efforts of the Student Body. A Union fee was assessed each student starting in 1956. This money provided the down-payment for a loan from the Federal Home Finance Agency. The remainder of the loan will be repaid through continued student fees.

The Union was opened for operation during the last summer session on a limited basis. It also provided facilities for several State Conferences which were held on the Campus during the summer. This fall showed how much the present students have needed and wanted this addition to the Campus. Every room and facility has been used almost to capacity.

The Union is the location of the Main Campus Cafeteria, (replacing the Nelson Hall Cafeteria). Other areas include a spacious Snack Bar, a large comfortable lounge, meeting rooms, recreation rooms and offices for many student organizations.

The policies, regulations and general programs of the Union remain in control of the student body through the Union Board. This is composed of students from each class, representatives of student government and faculty members appointed by the President. The Board elects a student manager to work with the Faculty Director.

In planning an "Open House", the Union Board asks the alumni and visitors to the Campus for the Homecoming festivities, to try to visit the Union on Saturday, October 17. There will be guides available (many of the



It is indeed a pleasure for the college to keep in close touch with its graduates through its Alumni Association. Your college is most grateful for the loyal support of so many of its fine graduates. The number is increasing each year, while not as rapidly as we had hoped, yet it is encouraging. Some new brochures are being prepared which help a great deal to inform prospective students in the expanding program of the college. A copy of each will be made available to you during the next few months.

It will assure your receiving each edition which will be issued during the year. We are looking for a big turnout for our alumni activities this year from the comments of many of our graduates.

NEW MEMBERS ADDED TO CSC FACULTY

When college opened on September 14, there were 15 new staff members on the faculty. Five of these were additional faculty members and ten were replacements. There were two retirements from the staff last spring, namely, Mr. Schmeeckle in Conservation and Mr. Rightsell in Physics.

Mr. Schmeeckle's place was taken by Mr. Lee G. Andreas who is completing his Master of Science degree at Iowa State University in the field of Forestry. He also had an undergraduate degree from the same college in Forestry. Mr. Andreas is originally from Milwaukee and attended Wisconsin State College at Milwaukee for several semesters before going to Iowa State University. Mr. Andreas has had experience in Forestry Extension Service in Iowa. He is unmarried.

Mr. Francis L. Schmitz replaced Mr. Rightsell in the Physics Department. Mr. Schmitz is completing his Master of Science degree at the University of Wisconsin in Physics, and was originally a graduate of Oshkosh State College. His home is at Malone, Wisconsin near Chilton. Mr. Schmitz has done some research work at the University. He is also unmarried.

Mr. Donald Rupert is taking two years leave of absence to complete his Ph.D. degree at Eastman School of Music. His place was taken by Mr. Paul L. Baumgartner who has his master of music degree from Eastman School and his Bachelor of Music from Heidelberg College at Tiffin, Ohio. He has also had a year of graduate work at Indiana University. Mr. Baumgartner is married. His wife is also a teacher of music, and they have two children.

Mr. Norman Birkholz who taught Chemistry last year left to accept a position in the University of Alaska at Fairbanks, and his place was taken by Dr. Lawrence G. Kallander who for the past couple of years has been teaching at Michigan Tech. He has a Bachelor of Science degree from St. Olaf College and his Master of Science and Ph.D. degrees from Michigan State University. Mr. Kallander is not married.

Dr. Lothar Iversen, who was a member of the Economics Department last year, has resigned to take care of his aged parents for the time being. His replacement for this year is Mr. James W. Noehl who has a Bachelor of Business Administration and Master of Business Administration degrees from the University of Minnesota, and who has for several years been instructor in Economics and Accounting in the University of Minnesota. Mr. Noehl is married and they have two sons.

Dr. Howard N. Schutter has been employed in the English Department to replace the part-time services of Mrs. Burress and Mrs. Thomson. Mr. Schutter has his Bachelor of Arts from Western Michigan College of Education, his Master of Arts and his Doctor of Education from the University of Michigan. Dr. Schutter is married and they have one child.

Miss Viola Bloom, who was a member of the Psychology Department the past two years, has resigned to do some Post-Doctoral work in the University of Nebraska. Miss Lucille L. Johnson of Copeland, Kansas, has

been employed to replace her. Miss Johnson has a Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science degree from Emporia State Teachers College in Kansas; a Master of Arts degree from the University of Chicago.

Mrs. Cecilia Welch has been on the staff for a number of years and has wished to retire and was to be replaced this year. However, she is staying on for the current school year to take the place of Miss Hildegard Kuse in the second grade at the Campus School. Miss Kuse is taking a leave of absence to do graduate work at the University of Colorado.

Mr. John Knutson of Madison has been employed to replace Mrs. Welch in the position she occupied last year as supervisor in the fifth grade. Mr. Knutson is a graduate of Wisconsin State College at Whitewater with a Master of Education degree from the University of Wisconsin, and for the past six years has been an elementary teacher in the Madison, Wisconsin school system. Prior to that he taught in a number of other Wisconsin cities. Mr. Knutson is married and they have one child.

Mr. Thomas J. Hayes, who has taught for several years in the Rhinelander High School, has been employed in the Campus School in the position of science and mathematics supervisor. He took over the work that Mrs. Marjorie Pfiffner has been doing for the past several years, although she is being retained on a part-time basis. He has a Bachelor's degree from Northland College and a Master of Science degree from the University of Wisconsin. Mr. Hayes is married and they have two children.

One new position has been added in the Department of Speech. Dr. William M. Dawson has been employed. Mr. Dawson is a graduate of Wisconsin State College at Whitewater, with a Bachelor of Science, Master of Science and Ph.D. degree from the University of Wisconsin. His teaching assignments have been at Mosinee, Ashland, Hartford, and the University of Wisconsin. Dr. Dawson is married and they have two children.

A new staff member has been added to the History Department in the person of Dr. Charles E. Freedeman. Mr. Freedeman is a graduate of Mount Union College, Alliance, Ohio, and has his Master of Arts and Ph.D. degrees from Columbia University, New York City. He also spent two years in the University of Paris in graduate work. His teaching experience has been in connection with the University of Maryland, and part of that program has been done overseas, especially in Heidelberg, Germany. Mr. Freedeman is married, but they have no children.

Mr. Dean L. Phelps has been added to the Geography Department. Mr. Phelps holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of California, Los Angeles, and his Master of Arts degree from the University of

Minnesota where he is also working at his Ph.D. degree, which he expects next year. Mr. and Mrs. Phelps have four children.

An additional position has been added to the English Department and Dr. Oscar M. Villarejo has been employed for that position. Mr. Villarejo earned his Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees at Geo. Washington University in Washington, D. C. and his Ph. D. degree in Columbia University, New York. His most recent teaching assignment has been at Memphis State University, Memphis, Tennessee. He has also served on the staff of the colleges in Arkansas, Texas and Maine, and the Geo. Washington University. Mr. and Mrs. Villarejo have no children.

Because of the heavy load of piano students in the Music Department, it has been necessary to add a Piano instructor. Miss Maija Jekabsons of Franklin Park, Illinois, has been employed. Miss Jekabsons is a graduate of Elmhurst College and has her Master of Arts degree from Eastman School of Music at Rochester. She is a young woman just starting her teaching work.

MASTER'S DEGREE PROGRAM

The State Coordinating Committee on Graduate Studies has been meeting monthly during the past year to develop plans for a new, cooperative master's degree program for classroom teachers. Dr. Haferbecker has represented Stevens Point on this committee. Other faculty members who served on study committees were Dr. Edgar Pierson, Dr. Pauline Isaacson, Dr. George Dixon, and Dr.

Burdette Eagon. Dr. Warren Jenkins is chairman of the Graduate Faculty at Stevens Point.

We are hopeful that the new program will begin in the summer of 1960, but a decision on this matter cannot be made until the 1959 legislature determines the budget for this purpose. We hope this will be known by December.

The state colleges and the University expect to jointly publish a common brochure describing the new cooperative program. This should be available in the spring of 1960.

Many details of the program have not been worked out but some information follows: The program will require four 8-week summer sessions, two at a state college and two at the University. Students will normally carry two 3-credit courses each summer. Courses will be of three general types (1) Liberal Studies (2) Specialized courses for teachers in particular academic areas and (3) Courses in education.

It is expected that the 1960 summer offerings will be in liberal studies and education. Specialized courses will be offered later as the program develops. The state colleges will select their 1960 offerings from the following ing courses (titles are tentative): The Biological World, The Physical World, Mathematical Concepts, World Population and Resources, Great Men and Issues in Western Civilization, Language in Society, Ideas in Literature, Philosophical Foundations of Education, Psychological Issues in Education, and Seminar in Problems of Teaching. Stevens Point will probably offer about eight of these ten courses.

The new program is designed to improve the competency of classroom teachers. Our survey in the alumni bulletin last fall indicates that many of our graduates will want to enroll for graduate study at Stevens Point. As soon as more definite information on graduate study is available, announcements will be made to school systems in our area and also in the Wisconsin Journal of Education. You may write Dean Haferbecker at CSC for information early in 1960.

The National Defense Education Act of 1958 affirmed the need to identify and educate more of the Nation's talented young men and women, and to develop programs through which the fullest development of their mental resources and technical skills may be realized. The main purpose of this Act is to make money available for long term, low interest loans to qualified students who are in need of such financial assistance in order to pursue a full-time course of study at a school of higher learning. The program includes provisions designed to encourage

education in science, mathematics, engineering and modern foreign languages. The program also includes provisions designed to attract an additional number of superior students to the teaching profession for service at the elementary and secondary school levels.

It should be emphasized that the Act does <u>not</u> restrict the loans to students in any special field of study. If an institution has adequate money in its student loan fund to meet the needs of all otherwise eligible applicants, the "special consideration" feature may have little practical relevance. However, when the total loan funds available at a given time are insufficient to assist all qualified applicants, special consideration must be given to those in the two catagories listed above, all other eligibility factors being equal.

It is obvious that no absolute or uniform definition of need, nor an arbitrary measure of its extent, can reasonably be established for all institutions and students participating in the program. Generally, the basic data considered is as follows:

- A. The academic background of the applicant.
- B. The probable course of study in college.
- C. The income and resources of the applicant's family.
 - D. The income and assets of the applicant.
- E. The costs reasonably necessary for the student's attendance at the institution.

Terms of student loans at Wisconsin State College at Stevens Point can be broken down as follows:

- A. Students eligible.
 - 1. Freshmen.
 - a. Must be accepted by the State Col-

lege.

- b. Must be in upper one-third of graduating class (high school).
- c. Must earn a grade point average of 2.5 to have loan continued the second semester.
 - 2. Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors.
- a. Must have been in residence at least one semester or qualify under Freshmen regulations.
- b. Those in residence must have earned and maintain at least a 2.25 over-all average at this college.
 - B. Amount (maximum).
 - 1. Freshmen \$150.00 per semester.
 - 2. Sophomores \$200.00 per semester.
 - 3. Juniors and Seniors \$250.00 per semes-
- ter. C. Interest 3 per cent per year on the unpaid balance beginning with the date on which repayment of the loan is to begin.
- D. Repayment Begins one year after a borrower ceases to pursue a full time course of study at an institution of higher education, and ends 11 years thereafter. Accelerated repayments are expected in almost all cases.

- E. Waiver of interest and postponement of payment This will be done while the borrower is attending an institution of higher education and during which the borrower is a member of the Armed Forces.
- F. Cancellation for service as teacher Up to one-half of any loan (plus interest) is cancelled for service as a full-time teacher in a public elementary or secondary school in a state, at the rate of 10 per cent of the amount of the loan plus interest for each complete academic year of such service.
- G. Nature of student contract The loan must be evidenced by note or other writing, but no security or endorsement may be required unless the borrower is a minor not legally able to create a binding obligation, in which case either security or endorsement may be required.
- H. Cancellation upon death or permanent disability Upon death or permanent and total disability, the loan is cancelled.

During the second semester of the school year 1958-59, which was the first semester of participation at CSC the total amount available for loans was \$5,500. The Federal Government's share is nine-tenths of this amount and the local institution one-tenth. Thirty-four applications were approved at an average of \$162 per loan.

A considerable increase in appropriation was granted for the 1959-60 school year. At the present time the amount available for student loans is \$28,028 with a further allocation of \$8,000 to be appropriated during the school term. Forty-five applications have been approved for the semester at an average amount of \$220 per loan.

The National Defense Student Loan Program was established in 1958, and, according to present legislation, is scheduled to operate for a period of eight years, terminating on June 30, 1966. Annual appropriations anticipated for the period will amount to about \$38,000.

High school students desiring further information regarding this plan may contact O. E. Radke the Director of Student Loans. This information disseminated to needy qualified students will be appreciated.

MUSIC DEPARTMENT

The big news in the Music Department this year is that we were authorized by the Board of Regents to offer a BACHELOR OF MUSIC DEGREE beginning this fall.

This degree offers students 60 hours in music and will bring our school in line with most schools in the country where training of school music teachers is offered. It will also give us the opportunity to offer to students a degree that is the one most often achieved by students in music.

This degree will also give the students a better

opportunity to develop in the area of music in which he is most interested: vocal or instrumental.

After the clouds of registration had settled we found that over 60 music majors had signed for instruction into our department. All classes are larger than before, with overloads being evidenced in all of the applied areas.

New to the staff this year is Miss Maiya Jekobsons and Paul Baumgartner. Miss Jekobsons is a graduate of Elmhurst college in Chicago and the Eastman School of Music. She is teaching theory, organ and piano. Mr. Paul Baumgartner is taking the position formerly filled by Mr. Rupert while the latter is on leave of absence to the Eastman School of Music for a doctorate. Mr. Baumgartner is also a graduate of the Eastman School of Music and has been doing work toward a doctorate at Indiana University. Mr. Baumgartner is teaching piano and Music History and Literature.
