UW-SP recycling project best in nation

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has rated the UW-SP recycling program as number one among the nation's schools of higher learning.

Chancellor Keith Sanders said the recognition is appropriate in view of UW-SP's long-standing role as a leader in the field of environmental education.

"This is yet another instance in which the university practices what it teaches," Sanders claimed.

Jerry Burling, director of purchasing and risk management, and Sharon Simonis, business manager for physical plant operations, were in Washington, D.C. May 15 to receive the EPA's first annual Administrator's Award from William K. Reilly.

EPA established nine categories for recognition, focusing its first round of recognition on innovative waste recycling programs.

UW-SP was the winner in the colleges and universities category with a comprehensive recycling, reuse and reduction (3 R's) program for the total student body and all university personnel. The local program was started in late 1989, and in its first full year of operation, resulted in savings of nearly \$19,000 plus revenues of \$4,200.

The most notable component of the project, in the estimation of the EPA, was the use of pellets from the papermaking industry as fuel in the coal-fired boiler, displacing 313 tons of coal, saving nearly \$3,500 in fuel costs in 1990 and reducing sulfur dioxide emissions. The ash was recycled as roadfill.

All told the university recycled an estimated 39 percent of its refuse during the past year and is steadily increasing that figure. "We may already be at 60 percent," according to Burling.

The university goal is to have 75 to 80 percent of all wastes on the campus recycled in some way in about a year, he reported.

Greg Diemer, assistant chancellor for business affairs, said that the level of success achieved in the recycling program "has taken a lot of cooperation and hard work of many people, particularly our custodians, union members and heating plant personnel."

He said Craig Weiss of the Bureau of Engineering and Energy Management in Madison provided invaluable assistance in developing the use of paper pellets at the heating plant.

The pellets are made from paper that goes to waste during the production process at papermaking mills in the Fox River Valley.

In the area of recycling, the university has a 30yard packer box, which saves 24 hours of labor per month in the handling of more than 18,000 pounds of mixed paper. In addition, the machinery enables shipment of a minimum of 10 ton of paper, increasing efficiency for transportation costs and also giving better payback on paper sales.

An aspect of recycling here that is a model for other schools is a SEARCH program (Students, Employees and Administration Recycling for Community Health). It involves recovering items for reuse which are normally disposed of at the end of each semester by students moving out of the residence halls. Appliances, clothing, miscellaneous supplies such as recreation items and apartment furnishings are collected and distributed to charitable organizations instead of being tossed in garbage cans.

Volunteers, primarily members of the Wisconsin State Employees Union, do the pickup of discarded items, saving nearly \$1,000 in tipping fees at landfills and adding nearly \$7,000 worth of usable goods for needy people in the area.

Burling said the successes being enjoyed today in recycling came after a slow and sometimes difficult start more than one and one-half years ago.

"We struggled with market development and getting the right containers and a sufficient number of containers to get going," he explained.

Developing an arrangement with the Fort Howard Corp. of Green Bay, which began purchasing an unsorted mixture of magazines, used stationery, newsprint and other grades of paper, was an important step forward, Burling continued.

Fort Howard was the only other Wisconsin winner of an EPA award. It took top honors in the large business category on the basis of developing a recycling advocacy program touching all facets of its operations.

Other winners were in the area of small business, kindergarten through grade 12 education institutions, community-civil and non-profit organizations, citizen, local government, state agency and federal agency.

Burling said his colleagues decided to enter the EPA competition because the university has been receiving a large number of inquiries from people at other campuses, government agencies and public organizations.

"Apparently the word was out that we were doing something positive," he observed.

Despite problems, we're being recognized for fair treatment

In recent months, many UW-Stevens Point alumni and friends have heard and read about allegations of discrimination and sexual harassment leveled against the university and many of its representatives. Sadly, this negative publicity has, in some instances.

promulgated accusations that are not true, but that nevertheless have inflicted unwarranted damage to the institution's reputation and programs. The truth is that UW-Stevens Point has been a forerunner in taking the steps necessary to provide a harassment-free, discrimination-free educational environment for all faculty, staff, and students. Indeed, our campus is beginning to be regarded as a national model in attaining this goal.

Dr. Bernice Sandler, a widely-known and respected

"This is the kind of commitment that many schools are afraid to undertake. Your school is translating its verbal commitment to making the classroom, the campus and the community a place that encourages equal opportunity as a way to prepare all students, men and women alike, for life and work in the next century.

"...These things are not accidents; they are the result of tough and supportive leadership at the highest levels. Support which is essential if change is to occur."

It is gratifying to receive this kind of praise from a woman who has worked so long and successfully in improving the campus climate for women nationwide.

I am now pleased to share with you some of the activities and programs the university has undertaken in recent years to elicit so fine a compliment from an individual of Dr. Sandler's stature:

1. During our 18 months of planning which culminated in the "Action Agenda for the '90s," a process which involved over 800 people, we set as one of our major priorities the goal of helping "faculty, staff and students better understand and accept broadened, global, cultural and gender perspectives." We indicated that we wanted "the vice chancellor and deans to develop a plan to provide support and recognition for faculty who develop or revise courses to include material on ethnic and gender issues." We said we wanted to "allow all administrators, supervisors, faculty, and academic staff to participate in programs that will strengthen their sensitivity to ethnic and gender issues." And we decided to increase the number of women and culturally-diverse faculty and staff recruited and retained. No university in Wisconsin has built more firmly into its agenda for the '90s an increased sensitivity to issues of gender equity and greater determination to develop a harassment-free educational environment. 2. The Faculty Senate adopted last year a strong statement about its intent to help create a harassmentfree environment. To quote from the document passed by the Senate, "It is the policy of the University of Wisconsin at Stevens Point to foster an environment of respect for the dignity and worth of all students, employees and guests of the university ... and to strive to eliminate bias, prejudice and discrimination and harassment in all forms and manifestations.

the past three years, we have increased the percentage of women who are on our faculty and staff. This fall, more than 50 percent of our new faculty and staff hired were women. It is probable that UW-Stevens Point hired a larger percentage of women into faculty and staff ranks this year than any other university in the UW System.

Throughout my two-and-one-half year tenure as UW-SP's Chancellor, I have added my personal support to the campus endeavors aimed at ensuring a harassment- and discrimination-free environment:

1. From my inaugural speech, and in nearly every other universitywide speech I have made since I came here, I have said that we needed to do everything we can to provide a hospitable working environment for everyone, including women and minorities. I have supported this position during the strategic planning process, in appearances before the Faculty Senate, and at "Take Back the Night" rallies.

2. Upon the recommendation of the Affirmative Action Committee, I hired Judy Goldsmith, a native of Wisconsin, graduate of UW-SP and former national president of NOW, to be the university's special advisor on affirmative action and equity. By bringing to our campus someone of national stature and whose dedication to full equality for everyone is a matter of public record, I made the strongest possible statement about my feelings regarding women. 3. On nearly every occasion where the opportunity has presented itself, I have said that the way to deal with sexual harassment is to encourage people to come forward and state their case. I continue to advocate this policy. 4. I have tried to lead by example. In all of my relations with women on this campus, I have respected their dignity, worked hard to make their world here an even better place in which to work, and on the two occasions when I have had the opportunity to make direct hires on my immediate staff, I have hired women. Whatever you read or hear from the press, the fact is that, in nearly every regard, UW-SP is becoming a national model of an institution committed "body and soul" to creating an environment free of harassment and discrimination, and respectful of the dignity of all.



authority on sexual harassment and discrimination, recently visited UW-SP as the keynote speaker for our fall convocation. Following her appearance at Stevens Point, she sent a letter to the "Pointer" which recognized the achievements the campus has made in ensuring fair treatment for both men and women. In her letter, she says.

"I spent two very intensive days at Stevens Point, most of it outlining and identifying the kinds of problems that exist in varying degrees on campuses around the country...

"Many of the recommendations I generally make for creating a more hospitable climate for women on campus are already in place at Stevens Point. I was delighted to learn that there are major sessions on sexual harassment, sexual assault and cultural diversity incorporated in your orientation of new students, and that some of this is directed to their parents as well.

"I was also pleased to see that there is a year-long program that Stevens Point has launched, 'The Century of Creativity: Celebration of Women's Achievements,' which will highlight some of the major historical and current contributions of women to society, and thereby further the understanding of faculty, staff and students, men and women alike...

3. There is empirical evidence that we are beginning to make progress toward our goal of a harassment/discrimination-free environment. Each of I hope that you will help us convey this message to our many publics during this difficult time in your alma mater's history.



A Nelsonville native who was the longtime state supervisor of education programs for military veterans was honored June 9 by his alma mater, UW-SP.

Laurin Palmer Gordon of 4723 Sheboygan Ave., Madison, became the 60th recipient of the Distinguished Alumnus Award during UW-SP's annual Alumni Day.

Gordon spent nearly half a century in the field of education, almost half of that time on the staff of the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction in Madison.

In the early 1950s, when veterans of World War II and the Korean War were taking advantage of benefits in the GI Bill, schools were crowded by their presence. Many private schools emerged, providing instruction in business, flight, cosmetology and a myriad of other fields. The DPI chose Gordon to oversee the quality of programming provided to the veterans.

Working as the representative of a state board, Gordon traveled throughout Wisconsin to inspect facilities and evaluate curricula. He uncovered problems in recruitment, teacher qualification and other areas which resulted in passage of the first laws in this country regulating programs for beneficiaries of the GI Bill in private schools by the Wisconsin Legislature.

After attending Stevens Point High School, Gordon earned a diploma from UW-SP (then the Stevens Point State Normal School) in 1921. He later returned to spend a year completing a state graded school course and to complete requirements for a degree. He received a bachelor's degree here in 1932 and then a master's from UW-Madison.

Gordon began his career in education 70 years ago as a rural school teacher in Portage County. He then became principal of a grade school in Woodford; principal of the state graded schools in Polar and Leopolis; mathematics and science teacher in Wittenberg High School; school district administrator for Johnson Creek and Mount Horeb Public Schools; and the principal of Roosevelt Junior High in Appleton.

He had logged more than 20 years of service to the DPI by the time he retired in 1973.

He has been active in community and church groups wherever he lived. After his retirement, he volunteered for WHA radio and other Madison organizations and served as president of that city's chapter of the American Association of Retired People. His 88th birthday was in November.

Gordon is the second member of his family to receive the Distinguished Alumnus Award from UW-SP. His brother, the late Royal Gordon of Milwaukee, was honored posthumously in 1989 for his innovative work as a corrections specialist who founded a rehabilitation center for inner-city law offenders. ■

Alumni give UW-SP high grades

More than 70 percent of alumni rate UW-SP as "excellent," the same portion would choose to attend UW-SP again, and more than 95 percent would highly recommend UW-SP to friends and family, according to a recently published survey.

Results of the "Alumni Image Study" have been published in a report to Chancellor Keith Sanders and the university community by its author, Larry Kokkeler of the UW-SP faculty and director of Communication Associates.

"Overall," Kokkeler says, "the results of the study suggest the alumni have a very positive image of UW-SP. The ratings given on'19 selected living skills' suggest they believe the education they received here was useful and valued."

The living skills section asked subjects to rate how well the university had prepared them to deal with tasks such as finding information, planning and carrying out projects, understanding written information and defining and solving problems.

More than 90 percent of the alumni identified something specific they liked about UW-SP, while 29 percent cited things they disliked. Campus size, location and the instructional staff appeared to be the most positive characteristics. Many of the negative opinions pertained to situations over which the university has little or no control, such as early morning classes or the area's climate.

In answer to the question "What did you learn at UW-SP that was especially useful to you in your career?" the number one response was "how to get along with others," followed by (2) "writing," (3) "confidence in subject matter," (4) "career information," (5) "how to communicate effectively," and (6) "management skills." Communication skills, both oral and written, were considered to be of the greatest value by most of the respondents.

In the section containing "11 characteristics used to evaluate universities," every category measuring some aspect of teaching was rated at the highest level by at least 70 percent of respondents. More than 80 percent ranked UW-SP in the top three universities in the state, with UW-Madison providing the only competition.

The professor, assisted by about 25 trained interviewers, was commissioned by the university to conduct the study. It was designed to assess how much alumni thought their education at UW-SP contributed to their personal and career growth in the "real world," and to measure their perceptions of university life. Because the campus is currently undergoing a strategic planning process and will mark its centennial in three years, Chancellor Sanders believed the timing was right for the study, which would provide important information for university planners. About 390 telephone interviews were completed from a random sample of 1,000 names and phone numbers. According to Kokkeler, this yielded a range of .5 percent, an acceptable margin of error indicating a 95 percent confidence level in the study. Alumni who had been out of school for three years or more were surveyed. "The vast majority of our alumni would select UW-SP again," Kokkeler says. "This indicates while UW-SP is not 'perfect' in the eyes of its graduates, they do think we have done an excellent job of preparing them for the world of work. The study indicates we are currently very competitive statewide and we hope to maintain this competitive edge and improve our position throughout the '90s," he predicts. This is not the first research project on which the chancellor has been the professor's boss. When Kokkeler was a doctoral candidate in communication at Southern Illinois University in the early 1970s, Sanders directed his dissertation, a political study of the 1972 elections

individuals, accompanied with a separate questionnaire addressed to personnel directors. Sanders, through the efforts of Kokkeler and his staff, plans to generate feedback about the educational needs of business. The professor says the forthcoming survey will not be used to evaluate current employees, but will seek to obtain information about what the business world really wants from an educational institution in the preparation of its employees. ■

News Briefs

Enrollment drawn down

Enrollment for the fall semester was 8,751, down 54 from last year in compliance with the UW System Board of Regent's mandate to reduce campus size. There are 300-plus foreign students, more than at any other state campus outside Madison and Milwaukee. Minority population of Hispanics, Native Americans, Africian Americans and Asian Americans grew by about 12 percent to 279.

Limits in teaching program

Because of a declining demand in the state for regular classroom elementary teachers and financial constraints at UW-SP, the School of Education is reducing the number of elementary education majors it will accept. In the recent past about 180 students per year were accepted for the program--now the limit will be 100 per year. In the future, students will be accepted on the basis of grade point average, scores from a test on reading, math and writing skills, an exam determining listening ability and a pre-professional interview developed by a professional testing organization. Students who are not accepted in their first try may re-apply a second time.

Big grant from AT&T

A \$350,000 equipment grant from AT&T in August will be used to enhance offerings for science students. One of the main components of the grant will be the installation of several dozen computers in a special classroom in the Science Hall for use by every member of the various chemistry, biology, physics, astronomy and paper science classes that will meet there. Objectives are for the students to be more active participants in methods of obtaining real-time data access/analysis and simulations of experiments. UW-SP and UW-Madison, which received \$74,000 in equipment, were among 44 colleges and universities receiving the AT&T grants.

the recipient of the first community service award given for volunteer work in support of Treehaven, UW-SP's northwoods natural resources field station. Vig was honored at the annual meeting of the Treehaven Information Council at the station facilities between Rhinelander and Tomahawk.

Treehaven's director, Corky McReynolds, said Vig has long been actively involved in natural resources education in this part of the state. After he retired from a 25-year career as superintendent of the Rhinelander School System, the district named its school forest in honor of Vig. He also is a past recipient of UW-SP's Distinguished Alumnus Award.

Nowadays, he is involved in developing and presenting programs at Treehaven and for groups in the Rhinelander area. He also writes a column, "Wisconsin Woodsmoke," that appears weekly in the Rhinelander Daily News, New Richmond News and Phillips Bee. He writes a quarterly column for Northwoods Almanac and has a radio show five times weekly on a Rhinelander station. Additionally, he works with several charitable organizations in his hometown.

McReynolds said he is making arrangements for the community service award to be given annually to people in the vicinity of Treehaven who make major contributions to the success of the field station operations.

Their next project will involve a more extensive alumni survey of about three or four thousand

\$10 million addition

UW-SP is planning a \$10.8 million addition to its Natural Resources Building. The State Building Commission has allocated planning funds and the federal government is considering making a major investment in the structure because of the role the facility will have in environmental protection. The addition and remodeling of existing space would create a wood utilization and marketing center, greenhouse, urban forestry/recreation laboratory, computer applications lab, outreach programs complex, herbarium, ichthyology/aquatic biology complex, animal care facility, chemical and hazardous waste storage, environmental chambers, walk-in freezer and lecture classrooms.

New program in France

A new overseas program has been established in France for each spring semester that includes practicum experience in culinary arts and intensive French language instruction. This is the eighth part of the world where UW-SP sends students for a semester of study. The headquarters for the new program is St. Raphael and Boulouris on the French Riviera. ■

Donations

Laird endows \$100,000 for leadership days

Melvin R. Laird announced a \$100,000 gift in April to UW-SP to perpetuate scholarship and youth leadership day programs long into the future

The endowment in the UW-SP Foundation will be used to finance the daylong sessions he has hosted on campus every other year since the mid-1960s, bringing together outstanding high school students of the area with state and national leaders.

Additional interest from the endowment will be earmarked for scholarships for students from north and central Wisconsin to attend the university

Laird said he arranged for the DeWitt and Lila Wallace-Reader's Digest Funds, two New York Citybased charitable foundations established by the magazine founders, to provide the endowment funds.

Since leaving public service, Laird, the former state senator, congressman from the Seventh Congressional District and U.S. Secretary of Defense and presidential adviser during the Nixon Administration, has been an executive at Reader's Digest. Chancellor Keith Sanders responded to the

announcement by saying this single gift will keep Laird Days going well into the next century

Sanders thanked Laird for providing nearly a halfmillion dollars in support of scholarships and youth leadership programs at UW-SP since the 1960s.

During the keynote speech, Lamar Alexander, U.S. Secretary of Defense, called the Laird Youth Leadership Day one of the finest programs of its kind in the country.

UW-SP receives rare Indian artifacts

A La Crosse woman has donated a collection of rare American Indian artifacts to UW-SP

Mrs. Linda Schleiter Sherwood's gift includes nearly 50 items, including pipes, tools, baskets, articles of handmade clothing and numerous examples of elaborate beadwork.

James Schurter, dean of academic support services, which includes the university library, where the collection will be maintained, said the bead work is "pretty valuable and quite impressive."

He estimated the value of one of the items to be "several thousand dollars." The total collection may be worth more than \$10,000, Schurter added


Mrs. Sherwood said the artifacts were collected early in this century by her grandfather, Dr. John Schleiter, a longtime La Crosse dentist. After his death in 1958, the items were rarely

viewed and kept in storage. Her decision to donate them to UW-SP came after she learned of the school's efforts to build a major collection of traditional Native American art.

The gift was arranged by Mrs. Sherwood's friend, Professor Mark Seiler, a La Crosse native now serving on the UW-SP foreign languages faculty. Seiler added to Mrs. Sherwood's gift by donating several Indian artifacts that had been in the possession of his family for many years.

"It sseemed appropriate to have this material at a state university where there is an emphasis on the American Indian," Mrs. Sherwood said. "Mark was very convincing," she added.

The items collected by Dr. Schleiter were acquired from Sioux Indians during his hunting trips in the

> west and from the Winnebago and Menominee Indians of Wisconsin.

UW-SP's efforts to build a Native American traditional art collection have been a spin-off of a special institutional program which provides educational and other services to Wisconsin's Indian tribes.

The James H. Albertson Learning Resources Center, which houses the university library, will be used to display the Menominee Clans Project, a one-of-akind set of 34 figures that represent the history of the Menominee Indians. James Frechette of Rhinelander has been commissioned to do the carving, and has completed nearly half of the work.

Bishop fund honors star athlete of yore

A \$20,000 endowment has been established with the UW-SP Foundation to support scholarships in memory of a star student athlete of the 1930s.

The gift memorializes LeRoy (Larry) Bishop, a state educator for 46 years, who died in 1984 in Colorado, where he had moved following his retirement.

Donors of the funds are Bishop's daughter and sonin-law, Beverly A. and Donald N. Lascody of Littleton, Colo.

They specified that the scholarships be given to incoming freshmen who had earned high school grade point averages between 3. and 3.5.

Bishop, a native of Pike Lake, was an all-conference selection in football, basketball and baseball and was voted the outstanding athlete with the highest scholastic record at what was then known as Central State Teachers College. The school won several conference championships during his student days.

One of his major accomplishments in basketball came in an exhibition game at Wisconsin Rapids in which the Pointers logged a surprising but convincing victory over the first squad of the UW-Madison Badgers

In 1977, Bishop was inducted into the Pointer Athletic Hall of Fame.

His career in education was spent as a teacher in Dancy and Rothschild, the superintendent of schools in Washburn and then 15 years as a school administrator for the Sheboygan Public School System. He also had been a high school coach and later an official for high school and college sports events in Wisconsin and Michigan.

A scholarship fund has been established in honor of Robert Weaver, emeritus professor of chemistry at UW-SP.

An endowment has been established in the UW-SP Foundation that will be used to provide an annual monetary award to an outstanding upper-class student in biochemistry.



The scholarship charter also states that for approximately equal qualifications, preference is to be given to minority students or any other student receiving few monetary awards.

David Worth said the Worth Company, of which he is president, will provide annual contributions of \$4,000 to the UW-SP Foundation for at least the next five years as a means of honoring "the tremendous talent" of Robert Kase

Half of the money will be used to establish a perpetual scholarship endowment that will give preference to jazz trumpet students. The first winner will be chosen in the spring of 1992, and each subsequent annual honoree will receive a larger amount as the endowment grows

The other \$2,000 of Worth's annual gifts will be used in full for the immediate support of student scholarships that will be based on these priorities: selected jazz trumpet student or students; trumpet major or majors; and selected jazz musician or musicians.

Worth said it is not unlikely that his company may continue to make annual contributions to the endowment after the five-year pledge period.

Moreover, the eligibility for recipients may be expanded to include students who play other jazz instruments or are pursuing vocal jazz studies. Music major performers, not necessarily in jazz, may also be considered.

Worth said few universities have a faculty member with the performance abilities possessed by Kase, adding that he hoped providing special support to help the professor attract top students will be an incentive for him to remain at UW-SP

Kase joined the UW-SP faculty in 1986 after earning a D.M.A. degree from the University of Minnesota, where he also taught. He has had many years of professional performing experience and has toured with Joel Gray in "Cabaret," played lead trumpet for several performers, including Sammy Davis Jr. and Lola Falana, and has done recording studio work. In addition, he has traveled for Yamaha as a trumpet soloist, published a method book and written several articles for professional magazines.

His students have won several prestigious jazz awards.

Worth's support of the jazz program follows by several months a challenge made by his father, Robert Worth, who is chairman of the board of Worth Company.

Robert Worth established a \$3,000 endowment and pledged to expand the fund for the support of students pursuing jazz percussion studies. He said he would personally recruit other sponsors of scholarships for such performers as outstanding clarinetists, pianists, trombonists, trumpeters and so forth.

About 20 years ago, the senior Worth established a \$10,000 endowment to support fisheries students in the College of Natural Resources as a memorial to his brother, Joseph.

David Worth said that beyond his own interest in Professor Kase's work, he was motivated to become involved in support of the music program because it had added much to his own collegiate experience. He said he valued friendships made there and that it had the makings for some of the most vivid memories of his days at UW-SP. He played with the University Jazz Band, Concert Band, Pep and Marching Bands, and sang in the

A total of 90 former athletes, coaches and special admittances have been named to the hall; following is a sketch of each of the 1991 inductees:

Chuck Braun, football, class of 1981--First-Team NAIA and Kodak All-American as a wide receiver. Holds single-game record for receiving yardage with 303 vs. Superior in 1981. Three-time team Most Valuable Player, three-time All-Wisconsin State University Conference, three-time All-NAIA District 14. Led NCAA Division III in receiving yardage and touchdowns in 1980. Led NAIA in receiving yardage and touchdowns in Athlete of the Year in 1980-81. Currently regional sales manager for Beam Industries. Resides in Eagan, Minn.

Bill Ferge, football, class of 1969--Two-time All-Wisconsin State University Conference offensive tackle. Team co-captain. Signed with Dallas Cowboys following graduation. Has coached football for 20 years and basketball for 15 at Marshfield Senior High School. Resides in Marshfield.

Don Friday, special admittance--Sports editor of the Stevens Point Journal for more than 30 years and lifelong resident of Stevens Point. Served three terms as president of Wisconsin Associated Press Sports Editors Association. First recipient of Wisconsin High School Baseball Coaches Association Media Award. Awarded Wisconsin State University Conference Certificate of

Appreciation for 30 years of WSUC coverage. Madonna Golla, field hockey/softball, class of 1984--All-Wisconsin Women's Intercollegiate Athletic

Henry Warner, basketball/ football/boxing, class of 1940--First-Team All-Wisconsin State University Conference in basketball. Team captain, led team in scoring. Coached at high schools in Amherst, Kimberly, and San Mateo, Calif. Union High Schools. Spent 17 years in Army Air Force. Died in 1980. ■

Robert Engelhard, forestry professor

Robert Engelhard has assumed a new, part-time position as executive director of the Wisconsin Woodland Owners Association since ending a 25-year teaching career at UW-SP in May.

The forestry professor has arranged to bring the office of the woodland owners group to campus, where he will continue to work.

immediately after graduating from Washington High School and served in a medical detachment in France after the close of World War II. Upon his return home and graduation from Utah State University, he was called back to military duty during the Korean War and was stationed at Fort Sill, Okla. After being mustered out a second time, he earned a master's degree in plant ecology from the University of Denver.

His forestry career was begun in 1952 as a staff member of the U.S. Forest Service in the Deep South for three years. In more recent times, he was chosen by the agency for two summer visiting scientist programs in San Francisco and New Orleans.

Back in Wisconsin, he spent nine years as a forest manager for Trees for Tomorrow out of its Merrill office. He made a career change in 1965 when he joined the conservation faculty at UW-SP, later taking a leave to pursue a Ph.D. in forest economics from Michigan State University.

Charles O. Reichl

Charles O. Reichl, who developed the university's vocal jazz program retired after 16 years of faculty service.

With his wife, Deborah McComas, he has formed a cottage industry, Carlanna Gardens, for the manufacture of "Fresh Pesto," an Italian sauce which is sold in Central Wisconsin and Madison.

During his career at the university, Reichl has taught the opera workshop and courses in conducting and music education. He also has given voice lessons and directed the Oratorio Chorus, Concert Choir and the Mid-Americans.

He served three years as chairman of the music department, from 1980 to 1983, and previously was assistant chairman.

After stepping down from administrative duties, he was active in the development of the university's jazz studies program, specializing in the vocal offerings. He converted the Mid-Americans organization from a swing to a jazz group and received several awards for its performing achievements

Roy Van Dreser

retired in May

Roy Van Dreser, a traveling auto parts salesman turned professor, retired last spring after 25 years on the UW-SP faculty.

Van Dreser, who is a specialist in educational media/audiovisual services, is a native of Chippewa Falls and a combat veteran of the Korean War.

He leaves the university with the distinction of having pioneered the development of educational television on campus. Van Dreser and his longtime colleague, Harlan Hoffbeck, who retired last year, used their own tools to build the university's first TV studio in the late 1960s in what then was the library building (now Park Student Services Center).

When the university established a department of instructional learning resources, he was appointed its first chairman and remained in that office for several terms.

He did not pursue higher education until after serving about four years as a salesman for a wholesale auto parts firm and as an infantryman in Korea. He then attended UW-Stout, where he earned bachelor's and master's degrees, and did graduate study at several Midwestern campuses before completing a doctorate from the University of Nebraska. Her early career in Stevens Point was during a period of rapid growth and change at the university. She was active in campus governance and became part of a very small group of women in the school's history ever elected to chair the faculty. In that position, she appointed committees that led to the formation of the present Faculty Senate.

In what is now The Association of University of Wisconsin Professionals, she served as local president, state secretary and member of the state executive board. The organization backed the controversial proposal to merge the two public university systems then operating in the state, and Wick had a hand in drafting some of the regulations that became law regarding faculty matters.

Charles Rumsey

Charles Rumsey, a Korean War veteran who became one of the university's leaders in promoting world peace and the study of it, has retired after spending 25 years on the history faculty.

When he arrived in Stevens Point in 1966, the Vietnam War was gaining momentum, and Rumsey joined a local group that took an active role in opposing U.S. involvement in the conflict. For the next seven years, he took part in rallies and Saturday morning vigils in front of the Stevens Point Post Office.

On campus, Rumsey was the second director of the Peace Studies Program and was one of the organizers of the Wisconsin Institute for the Study of War, Peace and Global Cooperation.

Rumsey is a specialist in economic and constitutional history, and did research several years ago on technology and contemporary issues. As a result, he developed a course on the way widespread use of the automobile changed American life. A native of Waterloo, Iowa, he earned two degrees from the University of Iowa and did additional study at the University of Chicago and UW-Madison. ■

Fred Leafgren

Fred Leafgren, assistant chancellor for student life, announced in August he would retire after serving 26 years on the school's administrative staff.

William Meyer, associate vice chancellor for ______ personnel and budget, was appointed to succeed Leafgren on an interim basis, while a search and screen committee seeks a permanent replacement.

Leafgren has been one of the university's three assistant chancellors since 1980, overseeing a broad range of operations serving students from health and counseling centers, housing, admissions, registration/records, financial aids, career planning/placement and student activities. the state. "Distinguished Professors" are determined on the basis of national and international recognition of their scholarly work and having the potential to significantly

increase economic development in the state. The regents make special appropriations of \$25,000 for each professor's position and the honored faculty members are asked to raise at least another \$25,000 in non-tax dollars from industry and other sources to support their work.

In July, Robert Govett, a faculty member at the University of Idaho, was named UW-SP's first "Distinguished Professor" in the field of wood use and





New Curriculum

Tribal, safety-health, environmental programs gain approval

The University of Wisconsin System Board of Regents has approved new minors for the Stevens Point campus in tribal sovereignty, safety and health protection, and environmental education for elementary and middle school teachers

The additions to the curriculum were implemented during the fall semester.

The tribal sovereignty minor, to be coordinated by the Department of History, is the most unusual of all the new offerings. It was developed in response to UW-SP's most plentiful minority group--American Indians.

The minor addresses the breadth of tribal government jurisdiction in such diverse areas as criminal and civil law, regulation of the land and environment, establishment of social welfare systems, profit and non-profit corporations, educational systems and the like.

A faculty committee that developed the program noted that many American Indian students at UW-SP intend to use their college education in serving their tribes, hence the need for instruction so they better understand special laws and governing procedures relating to tribal governments across the country.

The safety and health protection minor was developed at the urging of federal officials to fulfill a national need.

The National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health sought out UW-SP, largely on the strength of its offerings in health promotions/wellness, to train specialists in a "synergistic approach of risk prevention for the work force

Because there are few experts in American higher education in the area of occupational health and safety, UW-SP has made arrangements to hire an adjunct associate professor and also use consultants from area businesses in this unique program.

The federal government has provided the university with a \$100,000 grant to assist in the development of this health-related program.

The minor in environmental education for elementary and middle-level classes will provide an option for future teachers who are now being required by the Department of Public Instruction to complete a minor in a specialized field to fulfill certification requirements.

Among other new additions to the curriculum are options for the fashion merchandising major in retail/wholesale management, international merchandise management and store planning. The business administration major has new concentrations in fashion merchandising, forest recreation, technical foreign language--French, German and Spanish, and social gerontology.

Exceptional education major wins approval from regents

The University of Wisconsin System Board of Regents approved a new undergraduate major in September for the Stevens Point campus in the field of exceptional education.

Under the direction of UW-SP Professor Darvin Miller, the major was developed in response to a severe shortage of special education teachers in the state, including this area.

The curriculum emphasizes building on abilities of pecial education students as opposed to thrusting them into a remediation of their weaknesses. It further places emphasis on the value of integrating exceptional education programs for special students with activities in regular classrooms.

This focus, according to Miller, is new in the state's special education teacher training programs.



Previously, UW-SP's offerings were limited to minors and/or specializations in early childhood--exceptional educational needs, emotional disturbance, learning disabilities and mild-moderate mental retardation.

First Financial supports specialized banking offering

The specialized retail banking major was developed from proposals offered by John Seramur, president of First Financial Bank, headquartered in Stevens Point. He suggested that students need more problem-solving skills and effective human relations/interpersonal skills than are developed in conventional collegiate business programs.

To fulfill the recommendation of Seramur and others working as a committee representing the university and First Financial, the existing business administration major and communication minor were linked, and additional classes were added in psychology and communication.

About five students will be accepted for the program each year, with a maximum enrollment of about 20 when it gets into full swing. Most of the actual work experience will be gained during summer months, when the students are in paid internship positions.

When ground was broken in 1968 for construction of UW-SP's Fine Arts Center, an old man with expertise in the use of explosives ignited a small charge of dynamite to initiate the project.

Reason for such an uncoventional ceremony? School president, Lee Sherman Dreyfus, explained that when completed, the facility would create a cultural explosion in this part of the state.

That's exactly what has taken place. Gerard McKenna, dean of the UW-SP College of Fine Arts and Communication since 1989, oversees the departments of art and design, communication, music, theatre and dance, most of which are housed at the center. Artists from these units are largely

Artists from these units are largely responsible for either staging or arranging many of the important cultural events offered to people in Central Wisconsin. "We have a great deal of activity, and it is providing excellent laboratories for our students. In fact, that's why we are involved in so many things here." McKenna reports. "So many things" include more than 200 public events each year presented by the college under the banners of the Performing Arts Series (professional entertainers brought here from all parts of the world), music recitals and concerts, theater productions, and programs--usually lectures and films-- arranged by the communication faculty. Moreover, the communication program is home of "The Pointer" newspaper and WWSP-FM radio station, which sends a signal throughout the midstate area. Students are involved in an Pointer" newspaper and WWSP-FM radio station, which sends a signal throughout the midstate area. Students are involved in an experimental television program aired on the local cable outlet. Faculty have a Communication Development Institute which, among other projects, sponsors a summer program in alcohol and other drug abuse for Wisconsin high school leaders. Several national organizations have given awards to this project. The dean, who came here after serving 15 years on the UW-Milwaukee music faculty (half of that time as department chair), reports that the art and design, theatre, music and dance programs are all nationally certified by accrediting organizations. The career-oriented curriculum in the college includes an undergraduate arts management offering, which is the only one of its kind in the UW System. Linked to the music program is the American Suzuki Talent Education Center, which sponsors the largest and oldest summer international music education institute outside of Japan. "There's a lot of pride about what is happening in the fine arts and communication here," according to McKenna.














Team spirit is the natural resource at ...

Stevens Point Wis. _ Innovation, fed by consensus, is the signature of the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

The 97-year-old campus has built a reputation for creating programs, and doing it with the help of students, faculty and administrators. For example:

It was the nation's first campus to establish a conservation education program, which has grown into the 1,300-student College of Natural Resources. The program has become the largest in the nation. It includes majors in forestry, resource management, water resources, soil science, wildlife and offers one of only seven paper science majors in the United States.

In the northeast corner of campus is the 126-acre Schmeeckle Nature Reserve, named for the late Fred Schmeeckle, who established the conservation program in the 1930s.

Fifteen years ago, UW-Stevens Point was among a handful of universities that pioneered a program to improve the writing skills of undergraduates

The Writing Across the Curriculum program, in addition to the two required semesters of English composition, requires students to take two writing intensive courses taught by professors in various disciplines. About 50 professors now teach courses where grades are determined not only on mastery of the subject, but on writing competence

The university has forged an alliance with AT&T, which makes computers widely available on campus and allows students in dormitories to retrieve information from the most highly automated library system in a six-state region. There are 1,500 computers available on campus for student use

The campus computer system, Writing Across the Curriculum, and the forestry program have received Board of Regents designation as centers for excellence in the UW System.

"A good idea can be explored," Chancellor Keith R. Sanders said. "The faculty is as open to new ideas as any faculty I have ever been associated with.

Sanders is trying to strengthen consensus on campus through a strategic planning program that is exploring new directions for the 1990s. The program includes 850 students, staff, faculty and administrators

Ideas include requiring students to take ethics and conservation courses to help strengthen values and

improve the environment. "We're really fortunate here, because we have more power than students on other campuses," said Tami Butts, president of the student government and a member of Sander's cabinet. Students have also cooperated with administrators

Students have also cooperated with administrators in making brick-and-mortar projects possible. Two years ago, the university built a \$7 million Health Enhancement Center featuring an Olympic-sized swimming pool and other athletic facilities. Students agreed to contribute \$1.1 million for the project through fees. They were also active in its

planning and design. Stevens Point's mission is teaching, and officials here have no intention of changing.

The university does not want to be a research-oriented school, Sanders said. "It wants to be an institution where teaching is the most important thing we do. People here are not just happy with that mission, they are delighted with it."

Few students at UW-Stevens Point ever see a graduate teaching assistant, and the student-faculty

ratio is 19.5 students per full-time faculty member. "I've never had a graduate assistant teaching a class," said Dawn Day, a junior anthropology major from Union Grove. "I've never had a problem with the

quality of instructors. They are very concerned." Howard Thoyre, vice chancellor for academic affairs, said that although there were some graduate assistants on campus, none is the instructor of record in any class.

A survey of alumni conducted for the university last November gave teachers good grades. Of those surveyed, 81.7% said instructors' knowledge was good to excellent and 73.3% rated the overall quality

good to excellent and 73.3% rated the overall quality of instructors as good to excellent. The survey also reported that when respondents were asked what university they would choose if they could start school again, 73.4% of the alumni said UW-Stevens Point. Showing up the most often among the rest was UW-Madison, at 17.6%.

PROGRAMS OF NOTE In addition to its well-known natural resources program, UW-Stevens Point is noted for its philosophy department, which is one of the largest in the Midwest. The department has wide ranging offerings, including courses in environmental Russian, American Indian, Chinese and Indian

philosophy. Also, the physics and astronomy department operates the state's most active university-based planetarium programs.

The university also offers a wellness concentration in its health promotion/physical fitness program; fitting, since the campus is home to the National Wellness Institute. UW-Stevens Point is the only four-year college in the nation to offer an undergraduate degree in

in the nation to offer an undergraduate degree in zoo-keeping, which it calls captive wildlife management.

LOOKING FOR THE BEST

Campus administrators are trying to boost the quality of incoming freshmen. The average freshman last year was in the top 34% of his or her high school graduating class. This year, that student was in the top 29%. By 1994-95, officials expect the average to be in the top 25%

be in the top 25%. One way the university has sought to increase the quality of its students is by offering scholarships and honors internships. They're awarded based on nominations by high school counselors. "This empowers the counselors to reward their own students," said Dennis Tierney, deputy assistant chancellor for student life. Fifty \$1,000 Counselor's Choice Awards were made this year to students in the top 5% of their senior classes.

senior classe

Another 30 from the top 10% were chosen for training as residence hall assistants and will receive

room and board in return. "The average high school counselor knows that person far better than we would in an interview

person far better than we would in an interview situation," Tierney said. Stevens Point, both campus and community, sell themselves on safety. Campus security supervisor Velma Jain said one rape had been reported on campus in the last 19 years. "We have very few reported sexual assaults, although I'm sure there is unreported date rape, as on many campuses," Jain said. To belp control campus crime especially

To help control campus crime, especially vandalism, the university has established a uniformed patrol consisting of students. It operates from 6 p.m. to 2 a.m.


According to the state Office of Justice Assistance, the Stevens Point Police Department reported 55 violent crimes in 1990, a 26.7% drop from the previous year. The university has established a mentor

program for minority students that involves professionals in the community.

Junior forestry student Lamin Bojang, a black student from Gambia, said he had been warmly accepted on the predominantly white campus.

"In two years here, I have never experienced racism," he said. "In fact, I went home to Gambia this summer and I couldn't wait to get back here. When I leave, I will miss this place greatly."

Each fall, since the early 1980s, he has sponsored what has become a popular fall harvest festival to thank his suppliers of goods and customers with a meal and treat them to programs featuring expert Indian crafts people demonstrating their skills. This year, an authentic wedding ceremony was held in conjunction with the festival.


Serving tourists has changed a great deal in the time Counsell has been involved in the business. Today, many of his customers are members of minority groups—blacks and Hispanics from the Chicago area. "They are very interested in the Indian items," says the professor turned salesman.

The trading post has a rich history, being one of the oldest, as well as largest operations of its kind in this part of the country.

Counsell's father was a teacher who worked part time at the post until purchasing it in the 1940s. Counsell spent his summers and weekends in the business throughout his adult life until he purchased it from his mother, Pricilla, in 1981.

George Sappenfield, '47, the first graduate of the conservation education program (now the College of Natural Resources), has become an active mountain climber in his retirement. He lives in Arizona, spending winters in Mesa and summers near Flagstaff. In order to "prove I was there," he has his picture taken atop each mountain he has conquered. Here he is shown on Brown's Peak near Phoenix. Sappenfield retired in 1984 after serving 28 years as a history teacher at West High School in Phoenix. Soon thereafter, he took up his hobby as an active member of the Endangered Species of the Squaw Peak Skamps Mountain Climbing and Hiking Club. In the past five years, he has made it to the top of nearly every major peak in Arizona. One of his most important climbing accomplishments was logged in 1987 when he scaled the highest point in the contiguous United States, Mount Whitney in California. "We did it in one day," he says proudly. Sappenfield, who "tries to stick to mountains that have trail systems" has concluded from his experiences in the wild that rattlesnakes won't necessarily leave hikers alone if they don't disturb the snakes. He also has learned that each mountain creates its own weather. Rain has met him at the end of many of his climbs. Sappenfield enrolled at UW-SP in 1938 but had his education interrupted by military service in the South Pacific during World War II. Before settling in Arizona, he taught for several years in San Diego, Calif.




