## PURPLE RUNS WILD ON FIELD BEFORE GRADS TO WIN 38-0

### PLATTEVILLE GRIDDERS FIGHT HARD AGAINST ONSLAUGHTS OF POINTERS

Playing before one of the largest Homecoming crowds to witness a game on the local field in recent years, Central State Teacher's College eleven romped over Platteville college for a 38 to 0 victory last Saturday afternoon.

Although the score was one sided it is not evident of the fight that the Southern eleven put up. Going into the game as the underdogs, they started immediately to throw a scare into Weronke and Company. Two long passes were good for about thirty five yards. Capt. Weronke called his men together for a brief discussion and on the next play a Platteville pass was intercepted. The locals started their march down the field and the opposition was found to be more difficult than expected. After several exchanges of punts, the Gold clad eleven found themselves in midfield and it was then they started to play real ball. With McDonald and Laabs doing the bulk of the work, the ball was carried to the 30 yard line. Laabs, on a drive through right tackle, broke loose and aided by some fine blocking by Neuberger scored the first touchdown of the day. His kick missed the goal by inches. Shortly after kicking off to Platteville Bud Laabs, who has been playing stellar ball for the Pointers all season, was carried from the field. Chvala replaced him and the quarter ended with the score 6 to 0 in favor of Stevens Point.

### CHVALA, BANNACH SCORE

The second period was more Stevens Point. Chvala scored a touchdown in the middle of the quarter and was followed by Bannach, who picked up a fumble and galloped over the goal to score also. Rezatto kicked goal as the half came to a close.

### THREE MORE TOUCHDOWNS

The second half found Eggebrecht's clan leading the play. Touchdowns by Rezatto, McDonald, and Chvala and a kick after the touchdown by Fleetham completed the scoring for the locals.

Scotty McDonald and Rezatto showed the best in the Point backfield while Bannach and Capt. Weronke displayed fine play in the line. Johnson was the Platteville Teacher's star player. His ability to nab passes was spectacular. Scott's punting was brilliant for the Leitmenn.

## Secure Action On Proposed Project

President Robert Dodge Baldwin and local regent Mrs. L. M. Maloney, were absent this week end while in attendance at a conference in Madison concerning State Teachers' College matters.

The regents met Saturday and almost all day Sunday attempting to settle financial arrangements for the nine State Teachers' Colleges that would be acceptable to the 1929 legislature.

Action was also taken regarding the construction of the new training school building at Central State Teachers' College.

It is believed that through elimination of some of the features in the original plans which will not materially affect the structure or impair its efficiency, that the costs may be cut sufficiently to allow awarding of contracts.

The changes were given the approval of the board and bidders will soon be called in and contracts arranged.

The major change in the plans will be the cutting of a gallery in the gymnasium. Slight changes in other minor details will cut the cost sufficiently to bring the price within the appropriations.

The capital appropriations is yet to be determined and will be taken up at a later meeting.

President Baldwin feels that in all probability construction may soon begin.

## F. M. Ingler Writes On Central College

F. M. Ingler has written an article in the November issue of the Wisconsin Magazine which will be of interest to all students and faculty members of Central State Teacher's College.

Mr. Ingler has written a very interesting portrayal of the advantages and virtues of Central State Teacher's College.

He says, "Quality is the Cornerstone of the institution's policy. That it is a policy commanding popularity which lasts is evidenced by the mature teachers who are returning now in steadily increasing numbers, to finish work for degrees which the college now grants in all departments, in preference to going on to universities and the Colleges elsewhere whose degree courses have been long established.

"Another evidence of approval is the growing number of superintendents who seek its graduates to strengthen their respective staffs."

He ends by saying, "Altogether the impression one gets from recurring visits to this college is that here is a professional school with a pointed purpose, founded on the philosophy expressed in the words so frequently quoted by its President, and chiseled on the stone at Providence which marks the last resting place of that pioneer in educational statesmanship and teacher preparation, Horace Mann, 'Whatever is excellent, as God lives, is permanent.'"

The parade was escorted by Archie Durand, head police officer, and went down to the Market Square, over to Strong's Avenue, down to Division Street and back to Main Street. Crowds were out to view the parade and the fire department joined in the spirit by ringing the bell and blowing sirens.

A large crowd witnessed the game at 2:30 in the afternoon. Central College Championship team won a victory of 38 to 0 over Platteville, and now all are confident of another victory Nov. 12 when Point College team plays Oshkosh.

## SQUAD ANXIOUSLY AWAITS STRUGGLE WITH BUGTOWNERS

### HIRZY TO BE IN CHARGE OF ARMISTICE EVENTS

Having toppled over every opponent that has been encountered thus far this season, Coach Carl Eggebrecht and his clan of Purple warriors are hard at work these days in preparation for the championship game to be played with Oshkosh Teachers' College Monday, Nov. 12.

The game which promises to be the most thrilling battle played here this year will be the feature event of a large Armistice day program being prepared by the Stevens Point post of the American Legion. Capt. Ferd Hirzy, one of the most loyal supporters of C. T. C., is the head of the legion committee in charge of this event.

It is being planned throughout this section of the state, according to Mr. Hirzy, to celebrate the signing of armistice on Monday this year, because of the fact that November 11 falls on Sunday.

A service fitting to the dignity of Armistice day will be carried out at Memorial Park on the south side in the morning. Shortly after dinner, a parade including all of the visiting legionnaires and students will wind its way through the main streets of the city and will come to an end at the Fair grounds where the contest is to be held.

### CHAMPIONSHIP EXPECTED

This is the first time in many years that Central College can boast of having a team which has been a fighting contender for the state honors and continuing at the present rate the supporters of the Purple and Gold should be claiming a championship on the eve of the 12th.

Though Bud Laabs, ace of the Point backfield, may be sitting on the side as a result of an injury to his leg received in Homecoming game last Saturday, it is expected that Coach Eggebrecht should be able to put his strongest lineup on the field for the battle.

Capt. Ben Weronke, "Tiny Bannach, "Scotch" McDonald, Greg Charlesworth, and Bill Albrecht will close their careers, as wearers of the Point colors, in this contest and from any information that can be received from them, they all will be in the battle with the determination to leave behind them a perfect record.

### OSHKOSH IS POWERFUL

Oshkosh boasts a powerful squad again this season. Present records show Coach Howard Hancock's men to have won from Lawrence College, Marquette, Mich., Platteville, and La Crosse, having lost only to the Wisconsin "B" team. The Point eleven has piled up a total of 124 points to their opponents 14 in games to date. The list of Purple victims includes Northland, Marquette, Eau Claire, Stout, and Platteville, all games having been won by large scores. From comparative records everything indicates a battle royal, so plenty of action should be displayed.

The lineups are very uncertain but anyone who is willing to hazard a guess would place Capt. Weronke, Ferm, Charlesworth, Fors, Bannach, White, and Neuberger in the front line for the Pointers with McDonald, Dagneau, Rezatto, and Laabs, Vrobel, or Chvala in the backfield.

The game is expected to draw the largest crowd in the history of the local school.

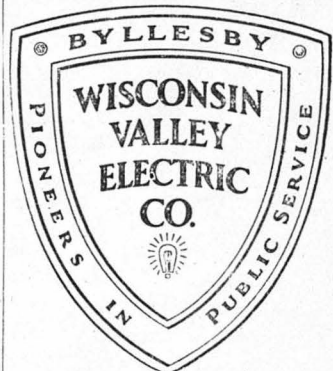
