A fascinating story of the progress of light from 8,000 B. C. to the present time was given by H. C. White in an assembly last Thursday. Mr. White, who worked with Thomas A. Edison, had examples of the earliest types of lamps, primitive varieties, and many lamps illustrating types of illumination to the present time.

The collection he exhibited is a valuable one. Mr. White wove an interesting and humorous story in with his demonstration of light.

A feature of the program was the oscillograph, the only machine of its kind in existence, showing by light rays the quality of musical tones. This machine was part of the \$18,000 equipment which Mr. White used in presenting his program.

This is the story of Jules Sandoz, an American by adoption. He was Swiss by birth and came to this country to seek his fortune in the Sandhills Region of Nebraska. Old Jules had four wives: the first was a slattern; the second was driven insane; the third ran off with an accordion player; and the fourth bore him six children. Mari Sandoz, the second child, wrote this book. Mari lived through and heard of some of these experiences from Jules. It is a vivid story of pioneer experiences and is essentially American.

New Division For Cage Tournament

The Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Association announced a major change in the state basketball tournaments to be held March 4 to April 2, at Madison.

Antigo District Exception

The association has decided not to have any district tournaments in the Class A schools this year but, instead, will substitute a plan whereby each Class A team will meet another member to decide which one will go to the state tournament to be held in the University of Wisconsin fieldhouse.

This plan will hold true with but one exception, in the Antigo district, Antigo, Rhinelander and Wausau will have a three-way tournament with the victor being qualified to attend the state meet.

The Class B tournaments will consist of eight teams where possible and four teams in the smaller and less populated districts. The winner will be paired in a regional tournament, the victors going to Madison.

The Class C divisional tournaments will include eight teams and will be run off the same as the Class B tournaments.

The Class A division includes schools with an enrollment of 800 or over, Class B includes schools with an enrollment between 201 and 800, Class C includes schools with an enrollment of less than 201.

Stevens Point High school will play its qualifying round game with Wisconsin Rapids, the winner going to the state meet.

The game at the half stood 14 to 13 with St. Norbert's on the long end but, when the Pointers began to click in the second half, they gained the lead which they never relinquished.

Green Knights Pull Away

The Pointers clicked beautifully in the first quarter and gained a 10 to 2 lead but then the Green knights retaliated and gradually wore down this lead until they edged out in front with a one point advantage. The brunt of the scoring in the first half was carried by Nimz and Johnston for Stevens Point while Sychalla, former Wausau high star, and Schumacher were tops for the Green Knights.

The beginning of the second half found St. Norberts increasing the lead which they held at the end of the first to 20 to 15. At this point Coach Kotal's boys decided to check this Green Knight splurge and began to toss the buckets in themselves.

Lindow cashed in on a medium shot and then two short shots in rapid succession by Warner brought the Pointers within one point of a tie. A free throw by Nimz tied the score and, when a few minutes later, Nimz dropped in a short shot Central State had

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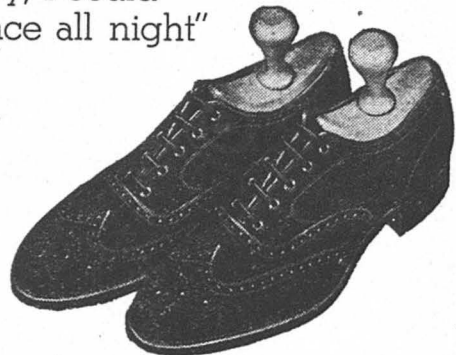
