C.M.T.C. Enrollment Started March 1st

President F. S. Hyer has received notification of his appointment as Chairman of the Portage County Enrollment Committee for the Citizen's Military Training Camps.

MEMBERSHIPS MUCH IN DEMAND

Enrollment for the 1936 summer camps began March first. Citizens Military Training Camps play an important part in the scheme of national defense. Young men from 17 to 24 years of age are brought together under the same circumstances. They are taught discipline and also to appreciate the other fellow's point of view. These camps, which are the outgrowth of the Plattsburg camps of 1913 and 1914, have been in constant operation since 1921. There are normally three applications for every camp vacancy. The number of applicants accepted depends upon the War Department's appropriation .
