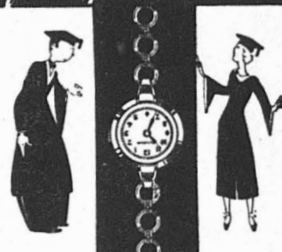

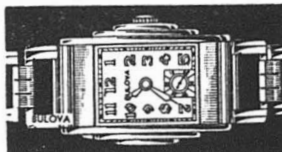

When Eddie came here Stevens Point was the doormat of the conference; today the Pointers are **THE** team to beat for the title. A feeling of athletic inferiority has been changed to a winning complex through the efforts of this one man.

Our Schmeeckle Field has been the scene of only one Point defeat since it was built. That was to Illinois Wesleyan, during last fall's unfortunate season. In basketball Kotal's teams have lost but one home game in the past four years, that to Milwaukee by a 37-36 score back in 1934. Such records can only be the result of great coaching.

The coaching situation at the University of Wisconsin has been in a turmoil for many years. Present day college students have no recollection of that ancient fall when Wisconsin last won a Big Ten football title. Today it seems as if the "U" has at last obtained a coach who can produce a winner. Yet it seems to us that Madison authorities wouldn't have had to go as far as Vil-

### URBANS HURLS WELL

Bob Steiner, "ace" southpaw hurler of Chi Delta Rho, suffered a wrist injury so Ray Urbans replaced him on the slab and made a successful debut with a seven hit game, Bremmer's homer giving the Phi Sigs their lone tally. The people of Stevens Point are invited to attend the concert. It promises to be a great event.

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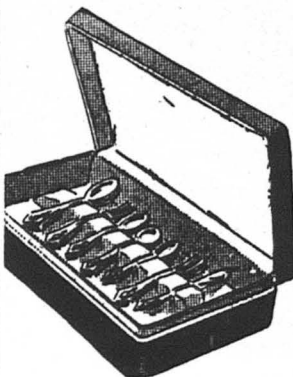
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## G. O. P. Convention To Be Held Tonight

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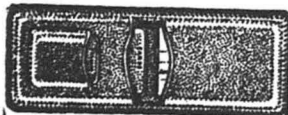
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
