Milwaukee Convention Highly Successful

Many Important Resolutions, Affecting Education and Schools In Wisconsin, Are Adopted

Over 13,000 teachers attended the meeting of the Wisconsin Education Association in Milwaukee, November 5, 6, and 7. Dr. Nels O. Reppen officially represented C. S. T. C. as a delegate to the convention and many members of the faculty attended the meetings. Mr. George C. Allez, librarian was in charge of the special session on libraries, Miss Mildred Davis was Chairman of the French meeting, and Miss Leah L. Diehl was in charge of the Geography section before which Mr. C. F. Watson appeared as one of the speakers.

Committee Report Accepted

Most of the special work of the convention was carried on at special meetings held throughout the days of the convention. The teachers elected Superintendent Banting of Waukesha president of the W. E. A. and passed on the report of the Committee on Resolutions. One motion placed before the convention received a great deal of comment and discussion. That motion was to give the Wis-

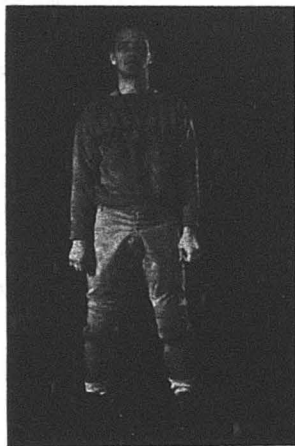
Last semester the faculty advisors adopted a similar policy, as a result of which pledging has been changed this year.

Oshkosh, Milwaukee, Whitewater Tied For Second In Close Conference Race

Once more Central State's grid-iron eleven, under the superior coaching of Coach Eddie Kotal, emerged on the top of the heap in the Southern Teacher's Conference. Whitewater's timely defeat at the hands of Platteville left the Pointers as the only team eligible

Milwaukee Drops Pointers 14-7

Milwaukee's Homecoming Record Kept Intact By Victory Over Pointers

Milwaukee Teachers upheld their wonderful Homecoming record by defeating a favored Stevens Point team, Saturday, 14 to 7. The Milwaukeeans scored in the first quarter and again in the third for their two touchdowns.

Burns Goes Over

The Pointers threatened the Green Gull goal several times but after being repulsed for three quarters of the game they finally crashed into the scoring column by a fourth quarter touchdown.

Milwaukee kicked off to the Pointers and the ball was returned to the 37 yard stripe. Three line plays lost 12 yards and the ball was kicked to Milwaukee's 40 yard line. On a quick kick Kleinmann booted one to the 12 yard marker where the Pointers were forced to fight within threatening distance of their own goal. On a smash into the line Houck fumbled and Smith, left tackle for the Green Gulls, recovered on the 12 yard line. The Pointers held for three downs, but on the last down, Burns, the fullback, crashed through the center for eight yards and the first touchdown. He also scored the extra point on an off-tackle play.

The second quarter found Johnston and Kleinmann engaging in a punting duel with Kleinmann outkicking the Point halfback.

New sectional divisions may be made as a part of the proposal adopted, and the experiment may change next year.

F. J. Schmeekle Is Author Of Texts . . .

Professor Fred J. Schmeekle, in collaboration with Opal Wiegand, principal of the Eagle River grade school, and Sholie Espeseth, assistant principal of the Eagle River school, is the author of three text books. Two of the books deal with agriculture and have been in use for over a year. His latest book, dealing with conservation, has just been published. All of the books have been published by the Schmeekle Publishing Co.

Work on the publications has taken about two years, for the lessons included in the texts were worked out and tested in actual class use. About 1500 copies are

in general use, mostly in Portage, Wood and Vilas counties. The books have been adopted by the state for state-graded and rural schools.

The first two books are titled "Elementary Agriculture" and deal with soils, plant life, dairying, farm management, raising and care of various crops, and general community life in rural districts. His latest publication titled, "Conservation and Renewal of our Natural Resources" deals with wild life, soils, forests, and allied subjects. Practical questions and charts help make the material more understandable.

consin Federation of Teachers permission to hold an exhibit at the convention. The motion was tabled by the Convention, but the convention, according to Mr. Reppen, did not attempt by its act to ridicule the federation or the A. F. of L. with which it is affiliated.

The report of the committee on resolutions was adopted with few changes. The adopted resolutions propose a county board of education and opportunities for a High School education for everyone throughout the state, continued support of vocational education, federal aid to schools without federal supervision of education itself, tenure of office for teachers, and educational freedom without political control or special laws restricting activities of teachers.

The resolutions also urged legislative support of bills providing for the inclusion of all of the state in school districts and the elimination of high school tuition. Other proposals condemned misrepresentation of school issues by garbled statistical data and the misuse of school funds.

Central State Reserve Used In Major Portion Of St. Norberts Game

Second Stringers Hold Foes To One Touchdown In Three Quarters

St. Norbert's college eleven reversed the decision given them by the Pointers last year and emerged victorious at Legion field, October 31, by a score of 19 to 0. This leaves the series seven to four with the Teachers still holding the edge.

Attempted Lateral Fails

The Pointers were completely outplayed in their annual gridiron battle with the Green Knights but this can be accounted for, to a certain degree, due to the fact that the reserves played the major part of the game. However, the reserves held Coach McKormick's team to one touchdown while they were in the game and really displayed a good brand of defensive football.

Finke, St. Norbert 200 pound fullback, scored two of their three touchdowns and gained the larger share of the 230 yards his team picked up from scrimmage. The other St. Norbert score was the result of an attempted lateral on the part of the Pointers behind their own goal line. McGuire at-

tempted to pass from his own end zone but when he was unable to find a receiver he chose to run. Just as he was to be tackled, he lateraled to Bucholz but before the Point signal-caller could decide what to do, Moritz, left end, managed to get control of the ball and their final six points.

Kleinmann immediately began to pass and on the completion of one to Wendling the ball was carried to the 22 yard marker. Another pass, Kleinmann to Eckenrod, was good for a first down on the two yard line. Here Eckenrod decided on a quarterback sneak and was successful in scoring the final touchdown. The extra point was scored on a pass from Kleinmann to Eckenrod.

McGuire Tallies

The Pointers rallied in the final period to score their lone marker. Nimz, on two runs, carried the ball to midfield and then a pass was ruled complete on interference, making it first and ten on Milwaukee's 35. Coach Kluge's boys held and took the ball on downs.

Kleinmann punted and the ball was returned to the 50. Nimz faded back to his own 35 and heaved one to McGuire who plowed to the four. On the next play, Johnston crashed center for two yards and then McGuire went around left end for the Point's only six points. The extra point was good on a pass from McGuire to Bremmer.

Bohan, Olsen and Sparhawk played well for the Point while the outstanding Milwaukee men were Kleinmann, Eckenrod and Burns.

As C. S. T. C. goes, so goes the nation! That seems to be the conclusion we can draw judging from the final results of the straw vote which was held here last week.

The totals for the straw vote gave Roosevelt 203 votes or 50.9 per cent, as compared with the 60.5 per cent which he drew according to the actual vote. Landon had 181 votes here, or 44.5 per cent as compared with the 37.4 per cent he received last Tuesday. All other presidential candidates got 4.5 per cent, while they received only 2.1 when the votes were really counted.

The results for governor gave La Follette 244 votes or 61.9 per cent, whereas he had 49.8 per cent in the actual vote. Lueck received 46 votes from the students or 11.4 per cent. He actually received 21.4 per cent. Wiley had 99 votes in the straw vote or 25 per cent, he received 28.6 per cent last Tuesday. All other candidates received 7 votes here, or 2.6 per cent, as compared with the 1.2 per cent they received in the election.

While not exactly correct, the straw vote certainly showed the trend quite correctly as far as this state and even the nation was concerned.
