The debaters then joined the other teams at Eau Claire to take part in the Eau Claire tournament.

Assembly Features Operatic Ensemble

The Monte Carlo Opera Ensemble will present an evening assembly program next Thursday, February 11, at 8:00 p. m. They will be seen and heard in "highlights" from the operas "Cavalleria Rusticana", "Aida", "Rigoletto", "Tannhauser", and "Il Trovatore".

The members are Walter Merhoff, baritone, of the Chicago Civic Opera Co.; Rubi Spencer Lyon, coloratura, of the Boston English Opera Co.; Gina Gaudio, violinist and Lois Albright, pianist, both of the Chicago Woman's Symphony; Mms. Le Rein; Giuseppe Lazarini, tenor; and May Barron, contralto, of the San Carlo Opera Co.

This semester a new system will be followed. A complete list of the names of all the practice teachers will be obtained, and each person desiring a back seat will have to prove his right to it.

LATE LETTERS STRENGTHEN SYMPOSIUM

Several letters which arrived too late to be included in the symposium in the last issue of the Pointer are now at hand. Their content is very similar to that of those which were included. Coming mainly from students who are at the University, they serve to emphasize the fact that Central State's credits are accepted without reservation, as long as the proper courses are taken in the correct sequence with "fair" grades.

Official Grading System

It was at about this time last year that the requirements of the new grading system were published. On this, the first anniversary of its appearance, it would seem proper to restate those requirements. Here they are:

TO RECEIVE A "C"

1. The student must learn the essentials of the course and demonstrate that he has the abilities and knowledge indicated by the field studied.
2. He must perform the required learning activities without continuous personal supervision on the part of the instructor.
3. He must turn in on time and in acceptable form all required material.

TO RECEIVE A "B"

1. The student must accomplish C1, C2, C3 before he is eligible for a "B" grade.

In Addition

2. He must show some special interest in the course beyond the required essentials and demonstrate his ability to follow that interest without close supervision on the part of the instructor.
3. He must go beyond the required essentials in quantity and accuracy of work.

TO RECEIVE AN "A"

1. He must accomplish C1, C2, C3, B2, B3 before he is eligible for an "A" grade.

In Addition

2. He must show by concrete pieces of work the ability and the willingness to make independent or self-initiated use of the essentials and knowledge required.

If the student does not meet the requirements of a "C" grade,

TO RECEIVE A "D"

1. He must accomplish C1.
2. He fails to accomplish C2 or C3, or both C2 and C3.

The student fails and receives an "F"

1. When he has not learned the essentials of the course, and has not demonstrated the abilities and knowledge required.

A study of these requirements would seem to indicate that some higher grades could be lowered. On the other hand, the F's that have been given may sometimes not have been merited.

Each instructor usually re-defines the system as it applies to his course.

Between presentations the group will discuss the interpretation of the concert numbers.

Pointers Avenue Previous Defeat

Johnston, Lindow, Nimz High Scorers In Overwhelming Victory

Playing inspired ball before a capacity crowd, Central State completely outclassed its rivals from the south, the Whitewater five, by the overwhelming score

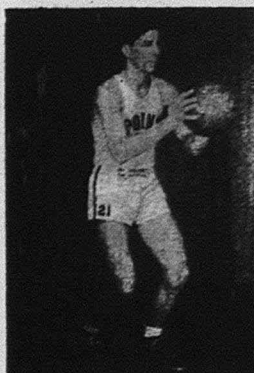

of 61 to 28. Whitewater, after the first few minutes, was merely another ball club to the Pointers and when the locals really started to click the Agnewmen never had a chance.

Second Half Best

Johnston opened the scoring by sinking two free throws which gave Point the lead, which they never relinquished. Coach Kotal's five then started to hit the bucket and within a short period of time the score was 21 to 10. Nimz and Johnston each collected two bas-

kets while the Whitewater eagers were gathering their additional four points to finish the scoring in the first period. The Pointers at half time were on the long end of a 29 to 14 score.

Whitewater Makes Try

It was during the second half that the local five really played the type of ball which they are capable of playing. In rapid succession, Lindow, Nimz, and Johnston rolled in the points and in-

creased the already large Point score to 48 to 18.

At this point Kotal sent in several substitutions and still the play was entirely in Central State's hands. With the game 59 to 26 Bohan, substitute guard, came through with a pair of gift shots to conclude Point's scoring and leave Whitewater far behind. Hulick, forward on the Agnew team, dropped in a long shot for his team's final points. The game ended shortly after with Farina and company fighting desperately to get control of the ball in order to get a few more heaves at the bucket to cut down the lead of 61 to 28.

Johnston, Andrews High

Rinka, Lindow, Johnston, Nimz, Warner, and Parish played exceptional ball for the Kotal squad while Farina, Andrews, and Hulick were outstanding for the opponents.

High scoring honors for the evening went to Johnston with 16 points who in turn was followed by Lindow and Nimz, each with thirteen and Rinka with nine. For Whitewater the high scorer was Andrews with ten points; Hulick was second high with five.

This victory placed the Pointers in a tie with Plattville for the
