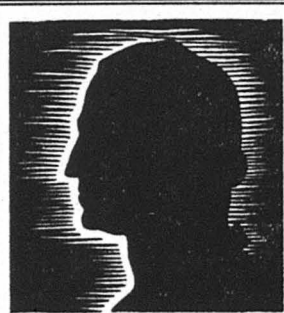
## Number Of N.Y.A Workers Increases

There have been 121 N. Y. A. jobs given out to students for this semester. Of this number 10 are part time workers who are limited to 20 hours per month and the remainder are allowed the maximum of 40 hours per month.

A meeting of the N. Y. A. students was held last Monday and plans were made at that time for position distribution of the various N. Y. A. workers who are to act as guides in the fire drills. This work is being undertaken in order that a more orderly and speedier evacuation of the building can be made during fire drills or in time of emergency.

N. Y. A. workers are again urged to get their time cards in by the 10th of each month.

According to information received here from national headquarters, N. Y. A. applications exceeded the permissible quotas on a national average by a ratio of 2.17 to 1. Wisconsin has 79 schools which have students receiving N. Y. A. aid and a total of 4,430 students are now getting N. Y. A. help. The ratio of application in the State of Wisconsin is 1.70 to 1.

Minus the services of Lindow, regular guard who is out with the flu, Stevens Point found the Oshkosh cagers a tough foe the first half but then the Pointers swung into action the second period and emerged with an easy 45 to 25 victory.

### Reserves Play

Rinka, Nimz, Parish, and Johnston contributed all of the points the first half while Lautenschlager, Oshkosh center, carried the brunt of the rival's attack. The first half ended with the locals on the long end of a 21 to 14 margin after having failed to show their true form.

The second period opened with the Pointers rolling in eight straight points, before Oshkosh collected any resemblance of a point. With the large lead of 29 to 14, in this rather slow game, Kotal substituted freely but still the margin was increased. The reserves finished the tilt after the regulars had accounted for the final sixteen points in the 45 to 25 victory.

### Slow Game

Johnston, Rinka, Nimz, Parish and Belongia all played fine ball for Stevens Point while Lautenschlager, Nell, and Mathwig were outstanding for the losers. High scoring honors for the evening went to Johnston with fifteen points. Lautenschlager and Nimz followed with fourteen and twelve points respectively.

The Point passing was rather erratic at times but not serious enough at any time to make the situation troublesome. The Oshkosh passing, likewise, was not working smoothly, therefore, making the game a dull and listless affair.
