## Grammar Round Table Holds Meeting

The Grammar Round Table held a meeting last Monday evening, Jan. 10. Dr. Nixon head of the Mathematics Department spoke on crime in the United States. He was preceded by a short business meeting.

Dr. Nixon, who has worked for the Department of Justice for almost three years, described federal prisons and the life of the prisoners. He spoke about federal offenses and how the law deals with law breakers.

He described in detail the industrial reformatory for young men at Chillicothe, Ohio, where he was stationed by the Bureau of Prisons as assistant supervisor of education. He showed many pictures of the prison and prison life.

He also discussed the Visual Education System in effect in school there, also the various shops where training in industrial arts is given. He displayed a magazine published by Prisons, "The Beacon" and also a news bulletin of the school.

The Grammar Department wishes to thank Dr. Nixon for his most interesting talk and recommends him to all other clubs as an excellent speaker.

## Five Schools Meet With C.S.T.C. As Host

### Stevens Point Civic Club Donates Trophy

Saturday, January 8th, five schools met in a debate tournament. Central State Teachers College acted as host. The Stevens Point Civic Club donated a silver loving cup as trophy to the winning school. The school winning the cup two successive years receives permanent possession of the trophy.

The following schools participated: Oshkosh, River Falls, Eau Claire, La Crosse, and Stevens Point Teachers Colleges.

As each school was not able to enter an equal number of teams, the winner was calculated on the basis of percentage of debates won. The following were visiting judges: Walter Wyman of River Falls, N. S. James and J. T. Taylor of Oshkosh, R. C. Judd, C. D. Donaldson, and S. R. Davenport of Eau Claire; D. B. Donaldson and W. H. Glover of La Crosse.

#### Prof. Mott Chairman

Mr. Mott acted as chairman of the tournament. The following members of the C. S. T. C. faculty assisted in judging: L. M. Burroughs, W. G. Jenkins, N. O. Reppen, H. R. Steiner, H. M. Tolo, and E. T. Smith. The Stevens Point judges alternated, so that at no time were more than two local judges serving in a round.

#### Point Wins Eighteen

The first round of debate began at eleven A. M. At the close of the fourth round the results were tabulated. Stevens Point, winning eighteen out of twenty debates, was declared winner with a percentage of ninety. River Falls was second with a percentage of 62.5. Eau Claire ranked third with a percentage of 45.

Three Stevens Point teams won all four of their debates: Laschewitsch and Haferbecker, the Becher sisters, and Verrill and Opphoven. The teams, Redeman and Bentz, and Rose and Timm, each lost one debate.

The Kotalmen, playing without the services of Don Johnston, Fred Nimz, Arnold Zaske and Al Sell, were badly out-classed and the team, even with the steady influence of Chet Rinka and Henry Warner, was unable to penetrate the tight Oshkosh defense.

The Sawdusters made eleven straight points before the Purple and Gold eagles broke into the scoring column on a free throw by Bob Olk, freshman forward, and the Central Staters were behind 24 to 7, at the end of the first half. The Pointers made only four field goals during the entire game and three of them came in the second half.

Daniels was high scorer for the game with twelve points on five field goals and two free throws while Henry Warner and Chet Rinka made four points each for the Kotalmen. Rinka and Warner played a good game for the Pointers, especially Rinka, who really played his heart out to make up for the loss of his star teammates.
