POINTERS TO OPPOSE QUAKERS

PREPARED TO AVENGE LOSS OF 1941 TILT

Central State Teachers College is prepared to celebrate her homecoming victory over Whitewater Teachers College Saturday night.

Everywhere one goes on the Central State campus, one hears that "the Pointers are out for revenge".

The team has a score to settle with the boys from the downstate school. The Agnew men inflicted a 45-12 drubbing to the Purple and Gold gridders last fall in a game which decided the conference championship. Eddie Kotal's boys haven't forgotten that afternoon. All summer long and during the past four weeks they have been dreaming and thinking about Whitewater. Saturday is the day they have been waiting for.

The Whitewater aggregation will come to town boasting a fine squad composed mostly of returning lettermen. They are led by the flashy, All-Conference quarter-back, Al Farina, whose brilliant play enabled his team to emerge victorious last fall. Two other all-conference men will be included in the Quakers' lineup. They are Walt Garvue, ace pass receiver, and Wally Buchhuber, outstanding pivot man. Baker, Mech, Mathewson, George, Hrnjak Wisch, Delaney and Mayer round out the lettermen. Whitewater lost to a powerful, rugged DeKalb eleven in their opening game last Saturday.

The Agnewmen will display a deadly aerial attack, which has Farina pitching to Garvue and Baker.

The Central State eleven will be in the best shape for the tilt. After disposing of Eau Claire Teachers 47-0, they have been going through arduous practice sessions during the past week and a half. Their practice sessions this week have been mainly pass defense.

The starting lineup for the Pointers is not definitely known but this department thinks that same eleven that started the Eau Claire game will get the call, with the exception of Posluszny, who suffered a broken leg in that game. His place will be taken over by swivel-hipped Frankie Koehn. Joe Goodrich will start at guard, but will probably see action at halfback and fullback before the game is over.

The Purple and Gold gridders have a great loss to overcome in losing Posluszny. All-Conference half-back. Louie's services will be sadly missed and we hope that he can be there to watch his teammates in action.

Saturday evening at eight-thirty, Norbert Gons and his orchestra will furnish the music for the finale of the gala week-end, the informal dance to be held in the Training School Gym.

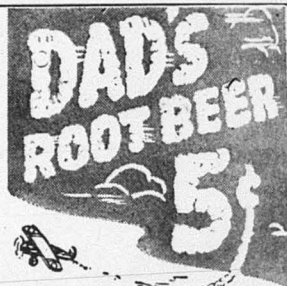
