Speech Clinic Serves Community

WSU's Speech Pathology and Audiology Clinic is one of the many ways the University combines advanced training with community service.

The rapidly growing Clinic began under the direction of Dr. Pauline Isaacson as a part of the Speech Department program four years ago. The modest beginning has now grown into a ten-room complex with a faculty of 3 located in the University's Old Main Building.

Identity of a problem is the first task of the Stevens Point Clinic. Some disorders treated include articulation, Cerebral Palsy, stuttering, cleft palates, deafness, hard of hearing, voice problems, laryngitis, and mental retardation.

Articulation disorders result in one's inability to correctly pronounce speech sounds in words. In some cases the University clinicians might employ the technique of producing a speech sound and then encouraging the patient to reproduce the same speech sound. Sometimes this method is sufficient to aid in correcting the problem. With more serious articulation disorders, a form of vocal phonics could be used in which the clinician actually forms the patients facial muscles and tongue so that the desired sound can be produced. The treatments which are used are many and varied.

The clinic's youngest patient is three and one-half years old. As Dr. Johnson points out, "Some parents become alarmed if their children are slow in speaking. This often leads to undue pressure on the child. This pressure at home can in itself be a factor in a child's speech development."

Speech and hearing disorders are neither uncommon or uncorrectable. Some knowledge expands so will the need for trained clinicians. Wisconsin State University at Stevens Point is proud of its progress in training the speech and hearing therapists of tomorrow and providing this worthwhile service to the people of central Wisconsin.

The purpose of the Stevens Point Clinic is twofold: It is a training lab for Speech Pathology and Audiology students whose positions are something other than interns under the direction of the faculty in this area. The competition is sponsored by Kodak in cooperation with the University Film Producers Association and the Cine-Mat Council on International Non-theatrical Events. Entries were screened in preliminary judging at 17 UFA member colleges and universities and finally judged in Rochester, New York by a panel of acknowledged movie experts, including J. Blair Watson, Dartmouth College, Frank B. Rowland, Illinois University, Paul Smith, National Education Association, J. Walter Evans, U.S. Navy Photographic Center (Rt.), and John Foy, Eastman Kodak Company.

In commenting on the four workshop sessions for the students, Laird predicted that "more challenging ideas and forthright dialogue would be the order of the day."



The Pointers suffered their second straight setback of the young season as they traveled to Oshkosh State on Wednesday, Dec. 4, only to find out they had little defense for the fast-break as the Titans rolled past Stevens Point 88-71 in the conference opener for both schools.

Coach Bob Krueger's cagers paced the Titans for the first ten minutes but then Oshkosh started a fast-break with 65' senior center Gene England clearing the boards and firing 10 ft. strikes to guards Tom Witasek and Dick Bourbonnais, who, in turn moved in for scores. Pointers' defense could not run with the Titans and before the intermission came around the Titans had a 46-33 lead.

When the second half started, the Titans showed no sign of let-up. Al Schmidt, John Laessack and Dick Bourbonnais led the Oshkosh fast break scoring 12 points between them in the first half. The Titans' Pointers, in that time, could not sustain a drive and with eight and a half minutes left, both teams sent in reserves and the game drew to a close.

Defense again paced the Pointers with 22 points and Wes Zuege followed with 20. Oshkosh had five players score in double figures with Gene England (18) and Dick Bourbonnais (16) setting the pace.
