After the initial seven days are up, the violator receives eries of notices reminding him to pay his fine. 

The Pointer is disturbed by the question raised in last week's Point Blank column concerning the number of stu-dents on the committee to select the faculty member for the Excellence in Teaching Award.

the Excellence in Teaching Award. There are presently only 12 students on the 35-member committee. Dr. Gordon Haferbecker, vice-president for academic affairs, defended the number by saying that the student was not the best judge of a teachers' ability in all cases. He claimed that there were several points to be evaluated outside of the classroom where only a teacher's culture of the classroom where only a teacher's methods.

evaluated outside of the classroom where only a teacher s colleagues would be concerned. Apparently these other "several points" are almost two-thirds more important than what our best teacher can per-form in the classroom. And what are these points—is a faculty member an excellent teacher if he publishes, par-ticipates' on faculty committees, obtains grants for the misresity or what? university or what?

We think the committee to choose the best teacher figure: 12 faculty members out of the total of 35, the rest figure:




